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ATTACHMENT A

Background on the establishment and administration of the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program

On 11 December 2020, the former Minister for Agriculture, Drought and Emergency Management, the Hon David Littleproud MP announced the establishment of the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (NFMIP). The NFMIP provides funding to the states and territories to contribute to or pay for the improvement or construction of flood mitigation infrastructure. This supports local communities mitigate their priority flood risks and reduce the impact of future flood events.

The NFMIP is funded under the Emergency Response Fund (ERF), which was established on the commencement of the *Emergency Response Fund Act 2019* (the ERF Act) on 12 December 2019, allows the Government to draw up to:

- \$50 million each financial year to build resilience to, and prepare for or reduce the risk of future natural disasters.
- \$150 million each financial year to fund emergency response and recovery following natural disasters in Australia that have a significant or catastrophic impact, when the Government determines that existing recovery programs are insufficient to meet the scale of the response required.

The NFMIP draws on the \$50 million pre-disaster resilience component of the ERF that was available for expenditure in 2020-21.

Eligibility

State and territory governments, in consultation with local governments and the community, were eligible to apply for funding for improvement of an existing or construction of a new flood mitigation infrastructure. Flood mitigation infrastructure is defined as an essential public asset having the primary purpose of reducing the risk of flood to, and/or impact of flooding on, a community or communities.

Eligible infrastructure included but was not limited to: dams, levees, bridges, culverts and other drainage systems, rainfall and river height measurement systems, weather radar systems and flood warning infrastructure.

Application process

The application period ran from 21 December 2020 until 12 February 2021. State and Territory Governments submitted their application by completing the application form provided in the NFMIP Program Guidelines, along with endorsement from their respective state or territory government emergency management minister.

In total, 74 applications from all States and Territories totalling \$231,773,019 were received.

Assessment process and recommended projects

Applications were assessed by a Program Review Panel (the Panel) comprised of representatives from the Department of Home Affairs, Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, the Treasury, Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications, the Bureau of Meteorology and the then National Drought and North Queensland Flood Response and Recovery Agency (incorporated within the National Recovery and Resilience Agency effective 1 July 2021).

The Panel assessed each NFMIP application against the eligibility and assessment criteria set out in the NFMIP Guidelines (the Guidelines). Projects were then given a weighted score and ranked nationally based on these scores. The Director-General Emergency Management Australia (DGEMA) reviewed the Panel's recommendation as the Commonwealth officer responsible for making recommendation to the Minister on the use of the ERF.

On 10 May 2021, states and territories were advised of the successful projects to be funded under the NFMIP.

On 27 May 2021, Minister Littleproud endorsed the final funding allocations and wrote to his ministerial counterparts in each State and Territory to advise them of these outcomes (MS21-001111 refers). This resulted in 22 projects being funded under the NFMIP across all of the country, including:

- 21 projects fully funded by the Commonwealth in line with the request made by the state or territory.
- 1 project partially funded by the Commonwealth (the Dutton Street Bridge project in Queensland will receive \$5.7 million of the \$8.8 million requested by the Queensland Government).

Mechanism for delivering funds to States and Territories

Negotiation of grant agreements ('Schedules')

Funding from the NFMIP is being supplied to states and territories as a 'grant' under section 32A of the ERF Act. The grant is provided through the Federation Funding Agreements (FFAs) negotiated by Treasury in 2020 to provide a consistent mechanism for payments to the states and territories.

The agreement between the Commonwealth and each jurisdiction is created through the co-signing of Schedules to the FFAs. The Schedules facilitate the transfer of funds to the jurisdictions and set the conditions for the delivery of funded projects as required by the Program Guidelines. The Schedules are co-signed by the Commonwealth and state or territory portfolio ministers responsible for emergency management, and funding can be transferred to the jurisdiction once the Schedules are signed by both parties.

Release of payments

When the minister responsible for emergency management decides that a grant of financial assistance should be made to a state or territory, that minister issues a direction that provides for the funds to be debited from the Emergency Response Fund Special Account and credited to the COAG Reform Fund, in preparation to be transferred to the jurisdictions.

This requirement was satisfied on 21 July 2021 after Minister Littleproud wrote to the Minister for Finance on 27 May 2021 directing that \$50 million, being the total value of the successful NFMIP projects, be transferred to the COAG Reform Fund.

Funding relating to each Schedule will be transferred to the jurisdictions as a single, upfront payment on 9 September 2021 with the conditions in the Schedule include setting out requirements relating to reporting, milestone payments, and audit and assurance.


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1. National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2021–22 Processes

The National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2021–22 is designed to achieve Australian Government objectives. This Program is funded from the \$50 million pre-disaster resilience component available from the Emergency Response Fund in the 2021-22 financial year. The Program is designed in accordance with the relevant legislation and subsidiary guidelines.



The Minister, as the decision maker, decides which applications will be funded under the Program.

Announcement of projects to be funded

The Minister will announce the projects to receive funding under the Program.

Announcements relating to individual projects must be managed jointly with the Commonwealth.

We will negotiate a Schedule under the Head Agreement with the state or territory government.

The relevant jurisdictional Minister responsible for emergency management will co-sign the Schedule.

Delivery of Funding

The Treasury will transfer the funding to the states and territories as a single, upfront payment in accordance with the requirements of the *Emergency Response Fund Act 2019 (Cth)*.

Evaluation of the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2021–22

We evaluate project/s and the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2021–22 as a whole. We base this on information provided to us and that we collect from various sources.

1.1 Introduction

These guidelines contain information for the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2021–22.

States and territories must read these guidelines before filling out an application.

This document sets out:

- the purpose of the Program
- the eligibility and assessment criteria
- how applications are considered and selected
- how funded projects are notified and how funding is received
- how projects will be monitored and evaluated
- responsibilities and expectations in relation to the Program.

2. About the Program

About the National Recovery and Resilience Agency

The National Recovery and Resilience Agency (the Agency) was established on 5 May 2021 by the Prime Minister, the Hon Scott Morrison MP, to coordinate and align, across Australia, community resilience and preparedness to withstand the often devastating impacts of natural disasters. Importantly, the Agency is also focused on developing Australia's capacity to bounce back and recover as seamlessly as possible, after a natural disaster has occurred.

Flood Mitigation: an Australian Government Priority

Australian communities have increasingly been exposed to the devastating adverse impacts of major or catastrophic flooding events. As reported in the State of the Climate 2020, heavy rainfall events in Australia are becoming more extreme and short-duration extreme rainfalls more intense.

Extreme rainfall events are associated with flash flooding and a consequent increased risk to communities. Deloitte Access Economics¹ has indicated that flooding is currently the most costly natural hazard-related cause of disaster when both tangible and intangible losses are considered and when forecasting for 2060. However, for many households and communities the ability to reduce flood risk is beyond their control.

Since floods are the most costly natural disaster, flood mitigation therefore has the potential to be a high impact investment, that aligns with the recommendations of both the Royal Commission into National Natural Disaster Arrangements and previous findings in the Productivity Commission's Report on Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements. As such, the construction or improvement of flood mitigation infrastructure (including green infrastructure) is a valuable and long-term investment in Australia's capability to reduce the risks of natural disasters to communities and economies, into the future.

The Emergency Response Fund (ERF)

The Emergency Response Fund (ERF) was established upon commencement of the *Emergency Response Fund Act 2019* (the ERF Act) on 12 December 2019. Policy support for the operation of the ERF is outlined in the Emergency Response Fund Program guidelines.

The Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements (DRFA) are the primary mechanism for the Commonwealth to provide natural disaster related financial assistance to state and territory governments. The ERF is as an investment fund that was established to provide assistance beyond what is already available to fund emergency response and natural disaster recovery and preparedness, where the Australian Government determines the existing recovery and resilience-building programs are insufficient to provide an appropriate response to natural disasters. It is an investment in the long-term sustainability of communities at risk of being affected by future disasters.

Under the ERF Act, the Australian Government may draw up to:

- \$50 million each financial year to build resilience to, and prepare for or reduce the risk of future natural disasters.
- \$150 million each financial year to fund emergency response and recovery following natural disasters in Australia that have a significant or catastrophic impact, when the Australian Government determines that existing recovery programs are insufficient to meet the scale of the response required.

The National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2021-22 is funded under the \$50 million building resilience component of the ERF as outlined above.

2.1 About the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2021–22

National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2021–22

The National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2021–22 (the Program) is funded from the \$50 million building resilience component of the ERF available in the 2021-22 financial year. These guidelines serve as a resource for the Agency (as the Program administrator) and state and territory governments (as Program applicants).

The Program demonstrates the Australian Government's commitment to provide additional support to communities across Australia to grow their resilience and preparedness to withstand the devastating impacts of flooding on communities and economies.

In 2020-21, the Australian Government initiated the first round of the Program, drawing on the \$50 million building resilience funding available in the 2020-21 financial year under the ERF. The 2021–22 Program builds on the success of the first round, providing an additional \$50 million to bring the total to \$100 million from the ERF over the two years to support communities across Australia to invest in flood mitigation preparedness.

The Program supports state, territory and local governments to build long-term, national flood resilience and preparedness and reduce the often-devastating impacts of flooding events on communities.

The Program gives effect to *National Priority 3: Enhanced Investment*, as detailed in the National Disaster Risk Reduction Framework, whereby the Australian Government will increase investment literacy across sectors, to ensure investment opportunities are leveraged to reduce disaster risk. The Program gives effect to this objective by targeting priority flood mitigation infrastructure, on a national

scale, with a view to maximising broader social and economic outcomes, including through limiting future disaster recovery needs and costs. The Program also helps to implement the National Climate Resilience and Adaptation Strategy and enhance community resilience to climate change impacts.

The Program will open to state and territory government applications in November 2021.

The Program seeks to deliver on the following Program objectives:

- reducing the expected future eligible expenditure under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements 2018
- reducing the exposure to flood hazards that influence insurance affordability for relevant households or local governments, through the improvement or construction of flood mitigation infrastructure
- mitigating against risk that influences insurance affordability for relevant household or local government by the improvement or construction of flood mitigation infrastructure
- ancillary to the above, local job creation.

3. Available funding under the Program

3.1 Funding available

The Australian Government has announced a total of \$50 million over one financial year (2021–22) for the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2021–22.

The maximum amount per project is \$10 million.

State and territory governments (as the applicants) are required to contribute towards the project through either a financial or in-kind, mandatory co-contribution to a minimum of 25 per cent of eligible expenditure.

Administration costs may be included in the funding application. Administration costs must not exceed 5 per cent of the estimated project costs and must be included in the total funding amount outlined in the application.

Funds may be distributed equitably across all state and territory jurisdictions, where possible and reasonable and in line with the project funding caps. 'Equitable distribution' does not necessarily mean an equal distribution of program funds

4. Eligibility criteria

We cannot consider an application if it does not satisfy all the eligibility criteria.

4.1 Who is eligible to apply for the Program?

Only Australian state or territory governments are eligible under the Program to apply for funding.

We can only accept applications:

from an Australian state or territory Australian Government where there is only one overarching application per state or territory government. In developing the overarching application, states and territories:

- may include an unlimited number of projects or applications, however states and territories should identify the top ten priority applications or projects within their jurisdictions for consideration.
- may engage third parties to deliver services on their behalf for any projects awarded funding under this Program.
- must consult with local governments and communities on project applications.

5. What the funding can be used for

5.1 Eligible Program Activities

Projects that are already fully funded are ineligible for the Program.

Projects that have already received full funding or a commitment of full funding are ineligible for Program funding for the same project. 'Full funding' is funding that equals the full estimated cost of the applicant project as verified by an independent relevant, suitably qualified and accredited industry professional.

Full funding is committed when the applicant jurisdiction has received written and reliable confirmation that full funding is available and will be allocated to the applicant project within a reasonable timeframe.

Only eligible Flood Mitigation Infrastructure can be funded under the Program.

Eligible infrastructure must directly demonstrate a positive effect on a community's resilience and preparedness to reduce flood risk and withstand the devastating impacts of flooding.

Under the Program, eligible Flood Mitigation Infrastructure may include, but is not limited to the following:

- Levees and levee systems (for example, structures built to contain, control or divert the flow of water)
- Infrastructure to aid flood plain restoration (for example, structures to raise riverbeds or excavate riverbanks)
- Green infrastructure that reduces the risk of flooding by protecting coastline or managing stormwater velocity or flow (for example, mangrove reforestation, greenways along floodplains, or bioswales).
 - For the purposes of the Program, 'Green Infrastructure' encompasses only those strategically planned natural and built landscape assets which incorporate environmental features, including but not limited to natural vegetation, which directly and demonstrably contribute to mitigating flood risk for the community in question.

Flood Mitigation Infrastructure may also include non-physical components, such as specific information technologies, that in their absence would render the flood mitigation infrastructure wholly inoperable.

Note: For the purposes of the Program, road infrastructure and improvements are excluded from this definition and are ineligible infrastructure.

Further guidance on these terms is provided in the **Glossary**.

Funding under the Program may be applied to the construction of new infrastructure that meets the definition above. Funding may be applied to the improvement of existing infrastructure but only where improvement is not simply routine maintenance necessary to maintain infrastructure functionality.

Each project must demonstrate that it will deliver one of the following outcomes:

- an improvement to existing Flood Mitigation Infrastructure, where the improvement is not better described as a regular or routine improvement required to address "wear and tear" or
- construction of new Flood Mitigation Infrastructure, for example, to mitigate a new or heightened priority flood risk that has arisen due to an increase in the intensity and/or frequency of flooding experienced in a particular community.

Applicants must also demonstrate how each project will directly contribute to a reduction in flood risk to, and the impact of flood on, a specific community or communities, and at least one of the following outcomes:

- reduction in expected future eligible expenditure under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements 2018, and/or
- Reducing the exposure to flood hazards that influence insurance affordability for relevant households or local governments, through the improvement or construction of flood mitigation infrastructure.

5.2 Eligible locations

Project must be delivered within the applicant's respective Australian state or territory.

5.3 Eligible expenditure

States and territories can only spend the funding on eligible expenditure incurred on eligible Program activities or agreed project activities.

Applicants must provide documentary evidence of whether and how a project will be funded if the full funding amount requested for a project is not awarded under this Program.

Applicants must disclose the amount of all funding, whether in cash or in-kind, already provided or committed to any aspect of a project submitted for funding under this Program, and the relationship of this amount to the total estimated project cost.

- If an application is successful, we may ask the jurisdiction to verify project costs provided in their application. This may include evidence such as quotes for major costs.
- Not all expenditure on the jurisdiction's project may be eligible for Program funding. The Program
 Delegate makes the final decision on what is eligible expenditure and may give additional
 guidance on eligible expenditure if required.

States and territories must incur the expenditure on their projects between the start date and end or completion date for their funding agreement for it to be eligible.

5.4 What the funding cannot be used for

States and territories cannot use the funding for the following activities:

- purchase of land
- wages
- major assets expenditure
- road infrastructure or improvements
- the covering of retrospective costs
- costs incurred in the preparation of a grant application or related documentation
- activities conducted outside of Australia
- subsidy of general ongoing administration of an organisation such as electricity, phone and rent
- overseas travel, and
- activities for which other Commonwealth, state, territory or local government bodies have primary responsibility.

Estimated and actual project costs for a project must not include:

 costs already incurred or expected to be incurred by the applicant or any third party in the development of an application or project related to this Program

- costs already incurred or expected to be incurred by any party in relation to the maintenance, improvement or construction of a project related to this Program
- costs relating to the acquisition or management of land or property.

6. Assessment Criteria

States and territories must address all of the following assessment criteria in the application.

The amount of detail and supporting evidence states and territories provide in their application should be relative to the size, complexity and grant amount requested.

The application form includes size limits and must be submitted in PDF format, with maximum file size of **10MB**.

In assessing applications, the Panel will consider the following criterion:

Criterion 1

The prioritisation of projects submitted by the state and territory government.

States and territories must demonstrate this by identifying:

- Prioritisation of the top 10 projects, not ranked, in addition to any other applications or projects submitted, in the one overarching application.
- Justification of the prioritisation.
- Prioritisation should align with the National Disaster Risk Reduction Framework, which will allow a
 national-level assessment of relative priority across states and territories.

Criterion 2

The relative flood risk and flood mitigation impact of the project

States and territories must demonstrate this by identifying:

- an indication of the risk before and after the proposed project.
- the risk assessment methodology used to determine the project risk rating.
- A description of the mitigation impact of the proposed project.

Criterion 3

The impact of the project on reducing exposure to flood risks that influence insurability of existing flood mitigation infrastructure.

States and territories must demonstrate this by identifying:

- How the project will reduce the risk
- In the case of new infrastructure, how this will reduce flood risks that would influence insurability.

Criterion 4

Availability of other Australian Government funding sources for the project.

The ERF Act and guidelines outline that the Australian Government may access up to \$50 million building resilience funding in each financial year from 2019-20. The ERF was setup to allow the Australian Government to draw on funds where it determines the existing recovery and resilience-building programs are insufficient to provide an appropriate response to natural Disasters. Therefore, states and territories must demonstrate this by providing:

 Where applicable, confirmation is requested as to why this project cannot be funded through more appropriate funding sources i.e. applications submitted for other funding sources including government, non-government and philanthropic. A statement to this effect should be included in the application.

Criterion 5

Evidence of consultation with the community, local government and any other relevant stakeholders.

States and territories must demonstrate this by identifying:

- documentary evidence of consultations with relevant local governments and/or communities in reference to each project submitted
- outcomes of those consultations

Note: State and territory governments may provide documentary evidence of prior consultations (**but not consultations finalised more than five years prior to date of application submission**) if outcomes arising from prior consultations are directly related to the Program project and of their continued relevance.

Criterion 6

The likelihood of project success, including evidence of capacity to complete the project to meet industry standards, to deadline and within estimated budget.

States and territories must demonstrate this by identifying:

- A project plan, including a justification for the level of funding requested.
- Evidence of capacity and capability and previous experience in undertaking similar scale projects, this could include capital works, references.
- A budget plan, include the mandatory 25 per cent co-contribution.

7. How to apply

Before applying, states and territories must read and understand these guidelines and the sample application form.

These documents are published on the National Recovery and Resilience Agency website at <u>www.recovery.gov.au</u>.

Any amendments and addenda² will be published on the Agency's website and by registering on this website will be automatically notified on any changes. The Agency's website is the authoritative source for information for this Program.

To apply states and territories must:

- complete the online application form available through the Agency's website
- provide all the information requested
- address all eligibility and assessment criteria
- include all necessary attachments
- submit the application by 17.00 ACT local time on 04 February 2022

States and territories are responsible for ensuring that their applications are complete and accurate. Giving false or misleading information is a serious offence under the <u>Criminal Code 1995 (Cth)</u> and we will investigate any false or misleading information and may exclude the application from further consideration.

If states and territories find an error in their application after submitting it, they should contact us immediately on <u>national.flood.mitigation@recovery.gov.au</u>. We are not obligated to accept any additional information, nor requests from jurisdictions to correct their application after the closing time.

If we find an error, inconsistency or omission, we may ask for clarification or additional information from states and territories that will not materially change the nature of their application in fairness to other applicants.

States and territories should keep a copy of their application and any supporting documents.

We will acknowledge that we have received applications within three working days.

If states and territories need further guidance around the application process or if they are unable to submit an application online they must contact us at <u>national.flood.mitigation@recovery.gov.au</u>.

7.1 Attachments to the application

We require states and territories in their application to address each of the following **key principles** for all projects submitted to the Program:

- The project directly demonstrates a positive effect on a community's resilience and preparedness to reduce flood risk and withstand the devastating impacts of flooding.
- The project maximises economic and social outcomes for the community.
- The project reduces the exposure to flood hazards that influence insurance affordability for relevant households or local governments, through the improvement or construction of flood mitigation infrastructure.

² Alterations and addenda include but are not limited to: corrections to currently published documents, changes to close times for applications, Questions and Answers (Q&A) documents and Frequently Asked Questions (FAQ) documents

 The project supports a reduction in the expected future eligible expenditure under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements 2018.

In addition, provide the following documents for each of the projects submitted under the application:

- a business case
- an indicative budget
- a project management plan including risk management
- evidence of consultation with the community, local government and any other relevant stakeholders
 - State and territory applicants must provide documentary evidence of consultations with relevant local governments and or communities in reference to **each project submitted**. **The outcomes of those consultations must be provided**.
 - State and territory governments may provide documentary evidence of prior consultations (but not consultations finalised more than five years prior to date of application submission) if outcomes arising from prior consultations are directly related to the Program and the projects in the application and of continued relevance.
 - State and territory governments must provide documentary evidence that they have consulted with the Australian Local Government Association about the availability of the Program in their jurisdiction.
- States and territories must provide documentary evidence as part of their overarching application
 of the relevant Emergency Management Minister's endorsement of both the overarching
 application and the ten projects or applications identified as priority projects, contained as part of
 the overarching application
- the priority ranking of projects
 - prioritisation should align with those in the <u>National Disaster Risk Reduction Framework</u>, which will allow a national-level assessment of relative priority across states and territories.
- support for the co-contribution on the terms offered.

The ERF Act and guidelines outline that the Australian Government may access up to \$50 million in building resilience funding each year from 2019-20.

Applicants must therefore provide documentary evidence for each project of:

- efforts to secure/applications submitted for relevant funding
- notifications of unsuccessful funding applications
- other relevant supporting documentation.

For each project, applicants must provide evidence of all relevant government, non-government and philanthropic funding:

- that the project may be/have been eligible for,
- that has been applied for, including the amount applied for, the outcome of the application, and:
 - where unsuccessful, the reasons provided
 - where successful, details of any funding already received or expected
 - if pending, the outcome notification date.

States and territories must attach supporting documentation to the application form in line with the instructions provided within the form. States and territories should only attach requested documents. We may not consider information in attachments that we do not request.

In addition to the above, jurisdictions should provide a covering summary (for example, in table format) of the assessment process that the state or territory has undertaken to determine the projects submitted to the Program, including the process for prioritising the top 10 projects. This summary should include, at a minimum, the following detail:

- The number of applications received
- Funding requested for each application
- The LGA(s) for each application
- Summary project detail for each application
- Summary detail on why the application was not successful
- The basis on which the top 10 projects were prioritised.

7.2 Timing of program processes

States and territories must submit an application between the published opening and closing dates specified on the cover page of these guidelines.

We will only accept a late application where an applicant can demonstrate exceptional circumstances prevented it from submitting the application by the closing date and time.

The Agency will decide, at its absolute discretion, if exceptional circumstances apply to a late application. The Agency will notify applicants as soon as practicable if the late application is deemed eligible for further assessment.

7.3 Questions during the application process

If states and territories have any questions during the application open period, contact <u>national.flood.mitigation@recovery.gov.au</u>.

If applicable, answers to questions will be posted on the Agency's website: <u>www.recovery.gov.au</u>.

8. The Program Review and Assessment Process

8.1 Assessment of applications

The inter-government Program Review Panel will assess each eligible application on its merit against the assessment criteria as follows:

- how well it meets the criteria
- how it compares to other applications
- how projects have been prioritised by the state or territory applying
- whether it provides value with relevant money.³ When assessing the extent to which an application represents value with relevant money, the Program Review Panel will have regard to:
- the overall objective/s to be achieved in providing the funding
- the relative value of the funding sought
- extent to which the geographic location of the application matches identified priorities
- the extent to which the evidence in the application demonstrates that it will contribute to meeting the outcomes/objectives.
- any national interest, financial, legal, regulatory, governance or other issue or risk that is identified during any due diligence processes conducted in respect of the
- states and territories applications.

8.2 Who will assess applications?

The inter-government Program Review Panel will assess each eligible application on its merit against the assessment criteria.

The Program Review Panel (the Panel) will comprise members agreed by the Agency's Coordinator-General.

Panel members will be drawn from relevant Commonwealth Portfolios such as:

- National Recovery and Resilience Agency
- Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet
- The Treasury
- Department of Finance
- Department of Home Affairs
- Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications
- Department of Agriculture, Water and the Environment
- Bureau of Meteorology
- Australian Climate Service.

Panel members will have suitable subject matter expertise, qualifications and experience to conduct the Program's assessment process that complies with the prescriptions in the *ERF Act* and the ERF guidelines.

³ See glossary for an explanation of 'value with money'.

The Panel will ensure that recommended projects under the Program are not more appropriately funded from another funding source and are highly likely, based on relevant evidence, to contribute to the delivery of the Program's strategic objectives.

Where necessary, the Panel may request applicants further substantiate any claims associated with flood risk, disaster recovery funding, insurance, and community impact or other criteria where the evidence provided by an applicant is considered insufficient or non-compelling.

The Panel, in its deliberations under this Program, may engage the services of a subject matter expert or representative from a non-government organisation, and may consider the advice of, and data provided by, Commonwealth agencies, including but not limited to the Bureau of Meteorology and the CSIRO.

The Panel will apply the eligibility outlined in section five and assessment criteria outlined in section six. Assessment will result in applications receiving a score, which will be used to inform funding allocations and recommendations.

The Panel will provide advice to the Coordinator-General of the Agency regarding the applications.

The Coordinator-General will recommend projects to the Minister for Emergency Management and National Recovery and Resilience for funding approval. The Coordinator-General may delegate to a Commonwealth Official the responsibility to make recommendations to the Minister for Emergency Management and Agency regarding any funding allocations to projects under the program, in accordance with the requirements of the *ERF Act*.

The Minister may take into account other advice or considerations in making a final determination on successful program projects. This includes a geographical and project type balance, with an equitable distribution across state and territory jurisdictions where possible and reasonable and in line with the project funding caps. 'Equitable distribution' does not necessarily mean an equal distribution of program funds.

8.3 Who will approve the funding under the Program?

In accordance with the *ERF Act*, the Minister for Emergency Management is responsible for deciding which projects to fund. In making these decisions, the Minister may take into account the findings of the Program Review Panel, the advice and recommendations of the Coordinator-General, the availability of funds for the purposes of the Program, and other considerations relevant to the applicable legislation and Program.

The Minister's decision is final in all matters, including:

- the approval of the funding
- the funding amount to be awarded
- the terms and conditions of the funding agreement.

Projects may be approved for full or part funding from this Program. Any funding shortfall either due to the funding approved or by the budget being exceeded during the life of the project is the responsibility of that state or territory.

If efficiencies are realised on completion of the project jurisdictions may be put to **other projects under this program** in that jurisdiction. Should jurisdiction use the funding toward other flood mitigation measures that state and territory must report that expenditure to the state and commonwealth.

9. Notification of application outcomes

We will advise states and territories of the outcome of their applications in writing and will be advised of any specific conditions attached to the funding.

9.1 Feedback on the application

Unsuccessful applications can receive feedback regarding the outcome. Written feedback will be provided on request.

10. Successful grant applications

10.1 The Funding Agreement

Applicants must enter into a funding agreement with the Commonwealth.

Following the Minister's decision, and after applicants have been notified of the Minister's decision on projects to be funded and the quantum of funding allocated, Schedules will be developed under the <u>Federation Funding Agreement</u> - Environment between the Commonwealth and each relevant state or territory government (the funding agreement or Schedule). The Schedule will detail the project delivery, program reporting and milestone requirements, and other relevant considerations.

This Schedule must be finalised before we can make any payments. We are not responsible for any expenditure incurred until the funding agreement is finalised and executed. If jurisdictions choose to start their projects before they have an executed funding agreement, they do so at their own risk.

10.2 How we pay the funding

The Schedule will state the:

- total funding amount to be paid, including GST
- any financial contributions must make
- any in-kind contributions will make
- any financial contribution provided by a third party

The Commonwealth Treasury will transfer funding allocation as a single, payment once the funding agreement has been finalised through the normal monthly payment mechanism to states and territories. States and territories will be required to report how the funding has been spent in accordance with the reporting milestones outlined in the Schedule.

11. Announcement of grants

If successful, the project and approved funding amount will be listed on the Agency website (<u>www.recovery.gov.au</u>). The Minister for Emergency Management and National Recovery and Resilience will make the first announcement about successful projects. A state and territory can request to have this announcement managed jointly with the Commonwealth.

12. How we monitor projects

12.1 Keeping us informed

States and territories should let us know if anything is likely to affect their funded projects or organisation.

We need to know of any key changes to organisations or business activities, particularly if they affect states and territories ability to complete the grant, carry on business, and pay debts due.

If states and territories become aware of a breach of terms and conditions under the funding agreement, they must contact us immediately.

States and territories must notify us of events relating to their projects and provide an opportunity for the Minister or their representative to attend.

12.2 Reporting

States and territories must submit **quarterly** reports in line with the funding agreement. Grantees must have systems in place to meet their data collection and reporting obligations outlined in their bilateral agreement. We will expect states and territories to report on:

progress against agreed project milestones and outcomes, as per table below:

- Expenditure of the funding.
- Reporting on the projects will be managed in accordance with the Schedule to the Federation Funding Agreement – Environment. Reporting will provide a snapshot of the progress of the delivery of the project at the point in time when it is received by the Commonwealth.
- States and territories will be required to provide:
 - an Interim Update required three months after the Schedule commences and completed on a biannual basis;
 - a Performance Report required six months after the Schedule commences and completed on a biannual basis; and
 - o a Final Report, no later than three months from the date that the project was completed.

 Further specific reporting details to meet agency reporting requirement will be discussed with states and territories and agreed for implementation through the development of the Schedules.

Ad-hoc reports

We may ask states and territories for ad-hoc reports on their funded projects. This may be to provide an update on progress, or any significant delays or difficulties in completing the project.

Final report

When states and territories complete their project, the must submit a final report as outlined in the funding agreement.

Final reports must:

- identify if and how outcomes have been achieved
- include the agreed evidence as specified in the funding agreement
- identify the total eligible expenditure incurred
- be submitted in format provided and in line with the timing outlined in the funding agreement.

12.3 Financial declaration

We may ask states and territories to provide a declaration that the funding was spent in accordance with the funding agreement and to report on any underspends of the funding.

12.4 Project visits

We may visit jurisdictions during or at the completion of their project agreement. We will provide states and territories with reasonable notice of any visit.

12.5 Evaluation

We will evaluate the Program to measure how well the outcomes and objectives have been achieved. We may use information from the application and reports for this purpose. We may also interview states and territories, or ask for more information to help us understand the Program's impact and to evaluate how effective the Program was in achieving its outcomes.

12.6 Acknowledgement

The Agency logo should be used on all materials related to projects under the Program. Whenever the logo is used, the publication must also acknowledge the Commonwealth as follows:

National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2021–22 – an Australian Government initiative'.

If states and territories make a public statement about a project funded under the Program, we require them to acknowledge the funding by using the following:

'This [name of project] received funding from the Australian Government.'

States and territories should nominate and point of contact to liaise with the Commonwealth on any media or announcements relating to the program. States and territories should notify the Agency and the Minister's office regarding any planned announcements relating to this program and each project.

First announcements relating to individual projects must be managed jointly with the Commonwealth.

13. Probity

The Australian Government is committed to ensuring that grant assessment and selection processes under the Program are fair, performed according to the published guidelines, incorporate appropriate safeguards against fraud, unlawful activities and other inappropriate conduct and are otherwise consistent with relevant legislation.

These guidelines may be updated from time-to-time by the National Recovery and Resilience Agency. When this happens, the revised guidelines will be published on the Agency's website at www.recovery.gov.au.

13.1 Enquiries and feedback

The Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (PM&C) complaints procedures are published on the PM&C website: www.pmc.gov.au/pmc/complaints. These procedures apply to complaints about this Program. All complaints about a grant process must be provided in writing.

Any questions states and territories have about decisions under this Program should be sent to national.flood.mitigation@recovery.gov.au.

If jurisdictions do not agree with the way their complaint is handled, they may complain to the <u>Commonwealth Ombudsman</u>. The Ombudsman will not usually look into a complaint unless the matter has first been raised directly with the National Recovery and Resilience Agency.

13.2 Conflicts of interest

Any conflicts of interest could affect the performance or integrity of the Program. There may be an actual, potential or perceived conflict of interest if Agency staff, any member of a committee (including the Program Review Panel) or advisor thereof and/or states and territories or any of their personnel:

- has a professional, commercial or personal relationship with a party who is able to influence the application selection process, such as an Australian Government official or member of an external committee (including the Program Review Panel)
- has a relationship with, or interest in, an organisation which is likely to interfere with or restrict an applicant from carrying out the proposed activities fairly and independently, or
- has a relationship with, or interest in, an organisation from which they will receive personal gain because the organisation receives some form of benefit (for example, funding) under the Program.

States and territories' will be asked to declare, as part of their application, any perceived or existing conflicts of interests or that, to the best of their knowledge, there is no conflict of interest.

If states and territories later identify an actual, potential or perceived conflict of interest, they must inform the National Recovery and Resilience Agency in writing immediately at national.flood.mitigation@recovery.gov.au.

Conflicts of interest for Australian Government officials will be handled as set out in the Australian <u>Public Service Code of Conduct (Section 13(7))</u> of the <u>Public Service Act 1999 (Cth)</u>. Committee members and other officials including the decision maker must also declare any conflicts of interest.

13.3 Privacy

We treat personal information according to the <u>Privacy Act 1988 (Cth)</u> and the <u>Australian Privacy</u> <u>Principles</u>. This includes letting states and territories know:

- what personal information we collect
- why we collect personal information
- how we use personal information
- who we give personal information to.

Personnel information can only be disclosed to someone else for the primary purpose for which it was collected, unless an exemption applies.

The Australian Government may also use and disclose information about funding applicants and recipients under this grant opportunity in any other Australian Government business or function. This includes disclosing grant information on the Agency website as required for reporting purposes and giving information to the Australian Taxation Office for compliance purposes.

We may share the information state and territories give us with other Commonwealth entities for purposes including government administration, research or service delivery, according to Australian laws.

As part of the application, states and territories must declare theri ability to comply with the *Privacy Act 1988* (Cth) and the Australian Privacy Principles, as if they were an agency for the purposes of that Act and impose the same privacy obligations on officers, employees, agents and subcontractors that they engage to assist with the activity, in respect of personal information collected, used, stored, or disclosed in connection with the activity. Accordingly, states and territories must not do anything, which if done by the Agency would breach an Australian Privacy Principle as defined in the Act.

13.4 Confidential Information

Other than any information available in the public domain, states and territories agree not to disclose to any person, other than us, any confidential information relating to the Program, without our prior written approval. The obligation will not be breached where states and territories are required by law, Parliament or a stock exchange to disclose the relevant information or where the relevant information is publicly available (other than through breach of a confidentiality or non-disclosure obligation).

We may, at any time, require states and territories to arrange for applicants' employees, agents or subcontractors to give a written undertaking relating to non-disclosure of our confidential information in a form we consider acceptable.

We will keep any information in connection with the Funding Agreement confidential to the extent that we are satisfied it meets all of the three conditions below:

- 1. clearly identify the information as confidential in the application and explain why we should treat it as confidential
- 2. the information is commercially sensitive
- 3. revealing the information would cause unreasonable harm to the applicant or someone else.

We will not be in breach of any confidentiality obligation if the information is disclosed to:

- the Panel and other Commonwealth employees and contractors to help us administer or manage the Program effectively
- employees and contractors of the Agency so we can research, assess, monitor and analyse our programs and activities

- employees and contractors of other Commonwealth agencies for any purpose, including government administration, research or service delivery
- other Commonwealth, state, territory or local government agencies in Program reports and consultations
- the Auditor-General, Ombudsman or Privacy Commissioner
- the responsible Minister or Parliamentary Secretary, and
- a House or a Committee of the Australian Parliament.

13.5 Freedom of information

All documents in the possession of the Australian Government, including those about this Program, may be subject to the *Freedom of Information Act 1982* (Cth) (FOI Act).

The purpose of the FOI Act is to give members of the public rights of access to information held by the Australian Government and its entities. Under the FOI Act, members of the public can seek access to documents held by the Australian Government. This right of access is limited only by the exceptions and exemptions necessary to protect essential public interests and private and business affairs of persons in respect of whom the information relates.

Agreed improvements to the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (NFMIP) 2021-2022

- 1. In order to improve the process for applicants and ensure the objectives of the program are met, the following changes have been made for the second tranche of the NFMIP 2021-22:
 - a. States and territories provide their to 10 priority projects.
 - This cap will obliges states and territories to be more selective and only submit applications for high priority projects that are appropriately evidenced.
 - This approach is designed to attract high quality applications that comply with program eligibility criteria and maximise program outcomes if projects are approved for funding.
 - The 2020-21 program assessment process was delayed due to multiple requests to jurisdictions that required further details and evidence to support application claims; extending the assessment period for over three months. Capping applicant projects to **10** will allow applicants to focus resources on providing comprehensive evidence to support applications and refine the administration of the review and assessment processes. These factors will facilitate a shortened and streamlined assessment period of two months.
 - b. Capping the funding amount for each project.
 - Project funding will be capped at **\$10m per project** to maximise the number of projects that can be funded under this program.
 - This will maximise the number of projects that can be funded under the program, in line with the program's national focus, while enabling the equitable distribution of funds across jurisdictions where possible, in line with project funding caps.
 - 'Equitable distribution' does not necessarily mean an equal distribution of funding amounts to each jurisdiction. It is preferable for all jurisdictions to receive funding under the program, however, this is subject to the merits of the projects when ranked nationally. There will be no cap on the amount of funding each jurisdiction can receive, meaning that a jurisdiction may be approved for multiple projects.
 - c. Mandating a co-contribution from jurisdictions.
 - This will encourage states and territories to only submit priority applications that the jurisdiction is also willing to financially commit to if the project is successful.
 - *d.* Allow the inclusion of a capped project cost for the administration of each project by states or territory (likely no more than 5% of the project cost).
 - Allocated administration costs enable states and territories to properly resource and budget for each project and comply with mandatory auditing and reporting

responsibilities. Given extensive concerns raised on this matter in the previous program, this change would be supported by jurisdictions as a critical improvement to the 2020-21 program.

- e. Specifically exclude road projects and narrow the scope of eligible infrastructure.
 - The 2020-21 NFMIP Program Guidelines included funding for road improvements. There are other funding programs available through all levels of government for road improvements and there are other more targeted infrastructure projects that would benefit from this funding.
 - Narrowing the eligibility criteria will encourage more targeted and better -evidenced project applications and improve the review and assessment timeframes for the program, supporting earlier commencement of projects.

Key Issues

 This submission provides advice on the critical steps and key deadlines for ensuring that the \$50 million in pre-disaster resilience funding available under the Emergency Response Fund (ERF) in 2020-21 and allocated for the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (the Program) are expended this financial year.

Finalising the approval of allocations

- 2. On 10 May 2021, you met with the Director General of Emergency Management Australia (EMA) to discuss the Program and approved 22 projects for funding allocated from the ERF (MS21-000705 refers). In order to use the entire \$50 million available from the ERF in 2020-21, you approved 21 projects to be fully funded and one Queensland project (Dutton Street Bridge, Ingham) to receive partial funding. Following your approval, the Department notified state and territory governments of the funding outcomes and the projects were publicly announced via media release (Attachment B refer).
- To ensure that your obligations under the ERF Act are satisfied, the final funding allocations for each project require your formal endorsement. The project funding allocations are at <u>Attachment A</u> for your signature.
- 4. Since the applications for the program were submitted through the respective state and territory emergency management ministers, we recommend you write to each Minister to formally advise of the funding allocations and seek their continued support through the delivery of the projects (<u>Attachment E1</u> through <u>Attachment E8</u> refer).

Ensuring the ERF funds are spent this financial year

5. Under the ERF Act, the \$50 million pre-disaster resilience component available for 2020-21 expires on 30 June 2021. It is therefore critical that the funds are made available for use before this date given that the projects have already been announced and the funds for 2021-22 have already been committed by you to another round of this Program.

satisfies the requirements under s32A ERF Act for you to request that the Minister for Finance draw down the funds from the ERF. Once your request has been actioned by the Department of Finance (DoF), the funds will be drawn down from the ERF Special Account to the Home Affairs ERF Special Account. The Department understands that at that point the \$50m component of the ERF will then be considered as fully expended from 2020-21.

- 7. To initiate this process, it is essential that you write to the Minister for Finance, copy the Treasurer, with a signed Ministerial Direction confirming that you have considered your legislative obligations, endorsed the final list of funded projects and are satisfied the Program agreements with the jurisdictions will be made, and that you authorise the release of \$50 million from the ERF as allocated Program funds by no later than 9 June 2021 (Attachment C and Attachment D).
- 8. As the ERF is currently invested, DoF and the Treasury require the time before 30 June 2021 to liquidate investments and transfer the funds to the Home Affairs ERF Special Account for disbursement to states and territories.
- 9. The funding will be transferred to states and territories through normal Treasury processes in early 2021-22 financial year. This is a routine financial process and aligns with the preference indicated by jurisdictions for receiving the funds. Given the timeframes involved, the jurisdictions have conveyed concerns that a large injection of Commonwealth funding before the end of the financial year in their respective Treasuries may create issues for their budget processes. There is higher comfort level from jurisdictions to receive the funding per the normal Treasury arrangements.

Mechanism for providing funding to the jurisdictions

- 10. The funding will be provided to states and territories as a 'grant' under sections 32 and 32A ERF Act. The grant is established under the *Federation Funding Agreements* (FFAs) negotiated by Treasury in 2020 to facilitate payments to the states and territories. The agreement between the Commonwealth and each jurisdiction will be created through the co-signing of Schedules to the FFA which facilitate the transfer of funds to the jurisdictions, and set the conditions for the delivery of funded projects as required by the Program Guidelines. The Schedules will be co-signed by you and the state or territory portfolio minister responsible for emergency management at which point the agreement will be finalised and the funding can be transferred to the jurisdictions.
- 11. The funding will be transferred to the jurisdictions as a single, upfront payment. The conditions in the Schedule include mechanisms for reporting, milestone payments, and audit and assurance as outlined in the Program Guidelines.
- 12. The Department has drafted eight Schedules (one for each jurisdiction) in consultation with the DoF, Treasury, and the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (PM&C). As required by the FFA process, these Schedules are currently with state and territory governments for their review and feedback. Once this process is complete, the Schedules will be provided to you for your urgent signature.

. The Department is rapidly progressing the agreements with the jurisdictions and they will be finalised, ensuring the funding is expended.

14. This approach provides states and territories with the required time to seek their Ministers' approvals, arrange for receipt of the funds through their Treasury processes, and ensure the conditions in the Schedules are clear. It also mitigates the risk of delays that could impact the delivery of the funding this financial year. If the Schedules were required before the ERF funding could be drawn down, there was a significant risk of jurisdictional delays, with the consequence being the Commonwealth may not have been able to deliver on the Program this financial year. This risk has been mitigated and the funds are considered to have been committed and expended from 2020-21.

Background

- 15. In accordance with the ERF Act 2019 (Section 20 (I)(c)-(f)) the ERF may be used to provide a grant of financial assistance to carry out a project that is directed towards achieving resilience to, preparedness for, or a reduction of risk of future disasters, or the long-term sustainability of a community in an area that is at risk of being affected by a natural disaster. Section 34 of the Act prescribes an annual limit of \$50 million which may be drawn from the ERF each financial year for this purpose.
- 16. On 4 December 2020, you wrote to the Prime Minister seeking his agreement to draw \$50 million from the ERF in 2020-21 to deliver a national program to invest in priority flood mitigation infrastructure initiatives (MS20-003016 refers). State and Territory Governments, in consultation with local governments and the community, were eligible to apply for funding. Applications opened on 21 December 2020 and closed on 12 February 2021. A total of 74 applications from eight jurisdictions totalling over \$232 million were received.

Consultation – internal/external

- 17. The DoF, Treasury, PM&C, Australian Government Solicitor, and Finance and Legal Divisions within the Department were consulted on process to draw down funds from the ERF and the development of the Ministerial Direction.
- 18. In consultation with Treasury, the Council on Federation Funding Relations (CFFR) was advised of this Program and the expected \$50 million in expenditure at the February and April 2021 meetings in accordance with National Cabinet requirements.
- 19. State and Territory Governments, PM&C, DoF and the Treasury have been consulted on the timeframes relating to approvals under the FFAs.

2. Overview

2.1 Purpose

- 2.1.1 These guidelines provide information on the administration of the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (the *program*). The intended users are the Australian Government, as the *program administrator*, and state and territory governments, as the intended *applicants*.
- 2.1.2 These guidelines may be updated at any time during the course of the *program* to provide further details as they arise, while maintaining the integrity and transparency of the program.
- 2.1.3 Queries regarding the *program* should be directed to <u>national.flood.mitigation@homeaffairs.gov.au</u>

2.2 Context

- 2.2.1 Many Australian communities are exposed to flooding, with varied impacts and damage that can be substantial and devastating. The Australian Government, in the State of the Climate 2020, reported that heavy rainfall events in Australia are becoming more intense, with an increase in the intensity of short-duration extreme rainfalls. Such events are associated with flash flooding and an increased risk to communities. Further, Deloitte Access Economics¹ found flooding to be the most costly natural hazard-related cause of disaster when both tangible and intangible losses are taken into account. However, for many households and communities the ability to reduce flood risk is beyond their control.
- 2.2.2 This *program* reflects the Australian Government's commitment to support impactful, national flood mitigation priorities through the provision of \$50 million in 2020-21 from the Emergency Response Fund. In line with National Priority 3: Enhanced investment of the *National Disaster Risk Reduction Framework*², the *program* will target high priority locally and nationally significant flood mitigation infrastructure activities, with a view to maximising broader social and economic outcomes, including through limiting future disaster recovery needs and costs.

2.3 Program purpose and outcomes

- 2.3.1 The *program* will contribute to, or pay for, the improvement or construction of *flood mitigation infrastructure* to support local communities mitigate their priority flood risks and reduce the impact of flood events.
- 2.3.2 The outcomes to be achieved through the *program* are:
 - reduction in the impact of future floods on a specific community or communities
 - reduction in the expected future eligible expenditure under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements 2018
 - positive change in the insurability of the existing flood mitigation infrastructure
 - addressing relevant household or local government insurance affordability as a result of the improvement or construction of the flood mitigation infrastructure
 - ancillary to the above, local job creation.

3. Timeframes

3.1 Delivery timeframes

- 3.1.1 Applications for the *program* will open on 21 December 2020, and **close at 5pm AEST on** 12 February 2021.
- 3.1.2 The Australian Government *project review panel* will assess applications in early 2021, with the intent to make a recommendation to the *Minister* and announce successful *projects* in March 2021.
- 3.1.3 Funding agreements with relevant state and territory governments will be established following this announcement, with the first milestone payment to be made prior to 30 June 2021.

3.2 Milestones

3.2.1 *Project* specific timeframes, including estimated date of completion, and delivery milestones will be determined with the relevant state and territory governments during the development of the bilateral agreement.

4. Funding and agreements

4.1 Funding source

- 4.1.1 The *program* is funded from the \$50 million component of the *Emergency Response Fund* and is made available through the *Council of Australian Governments* (COAG) Reform Fund.
- 4.1.2 The *Emergency Response Fund* is intended to complement existing sources of funding for relevant activities.

4.2 Allocation of funding

- 4.2.1 A maximum of \$50 million is available in 2020-21 for the *program*. Allocations will consider:
 - prioritisation of projects submitted by the state and territory government
 - availability of other Australian Government funding sources
 - relative flood risk and mitigation impact
 - reduction of relevant household or local government insurance premiums;
 - likelihood of project success, and
 - equitable share across all state and territory jurisdictions, where possible and reasonable.
- 4.2.2 There is no funding cap for each application or limit on the number of *applications* that can be submitted by a state or territory government.
- 4.2.3 A co-contribution from the state or territory government, and/or other appropriate funding partners is desirable but not essential.
- 4.2.4 The *Department* may provide funding for some or all of the estimated project costs.

4.3 **Project funding agreements**

4.3.1 Funding for successful *project* proposals will be provided to state and territory governments through the establishment of a relevant funding arrangement under *the Intergovernmental Agreement on Federal Financial Relations*.

5. Eligibility criteria

5.1 Application form criteria

- 5.1.1 An *application* will only be deemed valid for assessment if the application:
 - is made using the provided Application Form (see Attachment A)
 - is complete with all particulars
 - is submitted by a state or territory government agency
 - demonstrates support by the relevant state or territory emergency management minister
 - is provided to the *Department* via email at <u>national.flood.mitigation@homeaffairs.gov.au</u>, and
 - is provided to the *Department* by **5pm AEST 12 February 2021**.

5.2 Only a state or territory government may apply for program funding

- 5.2.1 Only a state or territory government may apply for *program* funding. However, a state or territory government may use a third party to deliver the *project* on its behalf, including through the procurement of a commercial service provider or through funding a local government.
- 5.2.2 This does not diminish the responsibility of state and territory governments to assure and audit the project's preservation of eligibility, integrity and expenditure. Further details are at Section 8: Audit and Assurance.
- 5.2.3 Interested local governments with eligible *projects* should contact their state or territory government's emergency management agency to discuss the state or territory government's support for and submission of that *project* on the local government's behalf.

5.3 Only flood mitigation infrastructure may be eligible for program funding

- 5.3.1 *Flood mitigation infrastructure* is an *essential public asset*, as defined in the *Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements 2018*, with the primary purpose of reducing the risk of flood to, and/or impact of flooding on, a community or communities.
- 5.3.2 Eligible infrastructure may include, but is not limited to: dams, levees, bridges, culverts and other drainage systems, rainfall and river height measurement systems, weather radar systems and flood warning infrastructure, where that infrastructure appropriately meets the definition of *flood mitigation infrastructure*.
- 5.3.3 *Flood mitigation infrastructure* may also include non-physical components, such as specific information technologies, that in their absence would render the flood mitigation infrastructure wholly inoperable.
- 5.3.4 State and territory governments are responsible for assessing and demonstrating that the infrastructure is *flood mitigation infrastructure* in accordance with paragraphs 5.3.1 to 5.3.3 above.
 - Such evidence may include businesses cases, flood mitigation strategies and other supporting documentation that demonstrates eligibility.

5.4 A project must be for the improvement of an existing or construction of a new flood mitigation infrastructure

5.4.1 State and territory governments may apply for *program* funding to support the improvement of an existing or the construction of a new *flood mitigation infrastructure*.

- 5.4.2 The improvement of an existing, or the construction of new, *flood mitigation infrastructure* must have an outcome of reducing flood risk to, **and** the impact of flood on, a specific community or communities, **and** at least one of the following outcomes:
 - reduction in expected future eligible expenditure under the *Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements 2018*
 - material improvement in the insurability of the existing flood mitigation infrastructure, and/or
 - addresses relevant household or local government insurance affordability as a result of the *flood mitigation infrastructure*.
- 5.4.3 State and territory governments are required to provide assurance to the Australian Government that the evidence supporting claims of the achievability of relevant outcomes are authoritative and can be relied on.

5.5 State and territory governments must consult with local governments and communities

- 5.5.1 State and territory governments are required to consult with, and evidence the consultation with, relevant local governments and/or community or communities on the need for and decision to implement the specific *flood mitigation infrastructure project*.
- 5.5.2 State and territory governments may draw on consultation previously undertaken with appropriate local governments and/or community or communities, where it can be demonstrated that the consultation is relevant and that the outcomes of this consultation remain unchanged.

5.6 State and territory government must indicate the relevant priority of projects

- 5.6.1 State and territory governments are required to disclose and evidence each *project's* relative priority within the state or territory and why each *project* has been submitted for *program* funding.
- 5.6.2 If a state or territory government is submitting multiple applications, each *project* must be prioritised within that group of applications.
- 5.6.3 The framework for determining prioritisation must be clearly articulated to allow for a national level assessment of relative priority across multiple states and territories.

5.7 Processes for estimating cost of *projects*

- 5.7.1 Consistent with the *Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements*³, the estimated *project* costs must be determined though:
 - a market response, or
 - cost estimation.
- 5.7.2 If 'market response' is the selected method, the applicable procurement processes must be followed when requesting pricing from the market.
- 5.7.3 If *cost estimation* is the selected method, *states must* verify the estimated <u>construction</u> cost by:
 - using an internal engineer or quantity surveyor with the appropriate level of expertise and experience, or

• engaging an independent engineer or quantity surveyor with the appropriate level of expertise and experience.

5.8 Project cost exclusions

- 5.8.1 Estimated and actual *project* costs must not include:
 - costs already incurred by the *applicant* or a local government, in the <u>delivery</u> of a *project* or *application* associated with this *program*
 - costs already incurred or expected to be incurred by the *applicant* or a local government, in the <u>development</u> of a *project* or *application* associated with this *program*,
 - costs already incurred by any party in relation to the maintenance, improvement or construction of the relevant *flood mitigation infrastructure*
 - the cost of the acquisition of land or property.

5.9 State and territory governments must disclose other *project* funding sources and amounts

- 5.9.1 State and territory governments must disclose all *project* funding sources and amounts provided or committed in relation to the *flood mitigation infrastructure*.
- 5.9.2 State and territory governments are also required to disclose whether and how *projects* will be delivered if the full funding request is not available through the *program*.

5.10 Only *projects* that do not have an existing full funding commitment are eligible for *program* funding

5.10.1 *Projects* where the *program* funding would be used to replace funding already committed to the *project* from other sources are not eligible under this *program*.

6. Application and assessment processes

6.1 Application process

- 6.1.1 *Applications* must be approved by the respective state or territory government emergency management minister prior to submission to the *Minister*. Evidence of this approval should be submitted with the *application*.
- 6.1.2 Completed *applications* are to be provided to the *Minister*, through the *Department*, by **5pm AEDT on 12 February 2021**.
- 6.1.3 *Applications* must be submitted using the Application Form template at <u>Attachment A</u>.
- 6.1.4 The Australian Government reserves the right to discuss the *application* or *project* and request additional information from the state or territory government through the *contact officer*.

6.2 Program Review Panel

- 6.2.1 The *program review panel* will consist of members of the *Department*, and other key Commonwealth agencies, as agreed by the Director General Emergency Management Australia. The *program review panel* will be chaired by a member of the *Department* delegated by the Director General Emergency Management Australia, being the Commonwealth official responsible for making recommendations to the *Minister* concerning the use of funding, in accordance with the *Emergency Response Fund Guidelines*.
- 6.2.2 *Program review panel* members will cover a range of relevant subject matter knowledge and expertise to ensure that:
 - projects and/or the program complement other Australian Government programs; and
 - there is no alternative funding source or duplication of proposals.
- 6.2.3 The *program review panel* will be responsible, where necessary, for substantiating with *applicants* any claims associated with flood risk, disaster recovery funding, insurance, and community impact where the evidence provided by an *applicant* is considered insufficient.
- 6.2.4 The Australian Government, through the *program review panel*, reserves the right to engage the services of a subject matter expert or representative from a non-government organisation, if required.
- 6.2.5 Allocations may also consider the advice of, and data provided by, Commonwealth agencies, such as the Bureau of Meteorology and the CSIRO.

6.3 Assessment principles

- 6.3.1 To ensure consistency, a predetermined assessment matrix, which refers to the eligibility and assessment criteria outlined in these *guidelines* will be used by the *program review panel*.
- 6.3.2 Assessment against this matrix will result in *applications* receiving a weighted score, which will be used to inform funding allocation decisions.

6.4 Equity principles

- 6.4.1 To ensure an equitable and transparent distribution of funds, allocations will be made based on the merit of each individual *application*.
- 6.4.2 Consideration will be given to the equitable distribution of the *program* funds to ensure all state and territory governments have an opportunity to receive support for their priority initiative.

6.4.3 'Equitable distribution' does not mean an equal distribution of *program* funds.

6.5 Decision making

- 6.5.1 The *Minister* is responsible for making decisions about *projects* to receive *program* funding and the amount of *program* funding to be allocated to a *project*.
- 6.5.2 Advice to the *Minister* on the projects recommended to receive program funding will be provided by the Director General of Emergency Management Australia, informed by the *program review panel*. The *Minister* may take into account other advice as appropriate.

6.6 Probity

- 6.6.1 The *Department* will administer the *program* with fairness, transparency, contestability and accountability.
- 6.6.2 The *Department* will ensure equality of access to information by developing a regularly updated guidance document that in response to relevant queries submitted to the Department.

7. Monitoring and reporting

7.1 Project reporting

- 7.1.1 State and territory governments must undertake regular monitoring and reporting in line with the project-by-project requirements outlined in the bilateral agreement.
- 7.1.2 The Australian Government may request additional information and/or reporting, outside the agreed milestones, if deemed necessary.
- 7.1.3 *Project* reporting will be considered as supporting documentation during the audit and assurance process.

8. Audit and assurance

8.1 *Program* assurance is informed by the *Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements* 2018 state assurance activities⁴

- 8.1.1 The objectives of the *program* assurance activities are to provide the Commonwealth with reasonable assurance over:
 - each state or territory government's *Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements Management System*, <u>as it relates</u> to state and territory government controls for:
 - o market response
 - o cost estimation
 - the eligibility and integrity of the expenditure included in the *project* expenditure acquittal form.
- 8.1.2 The *Department* will confirm, and the state or territory government must provide a copy of, the relevant assurance report provided for the purposes of the *Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements* 2018⁵.

8.2 State and territory government are required to submit an audit report to acquit the *project*

- 8.2.1 State and territory governments in receipt of *program* funding are required to submit an audited *project* expenditure acquittal to the *Department* no later than <u>nine months from the end of the</u> <u>financial year</u> (that is, for the audit of the period 1 July 2020 30 June 2021, the audit report is due no later than 31 March 2022) in which the project was completed, unless otherwise specified in the funding agreement. This timeframe is consistent with the *Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements*.
- 8.2.2 State and territory governments must engage the services of a *state appointed auditor* to undertake the audit activity.
- 8.2.3 On request from the Department, the *state appointed auditor* must be available to the *Department* or its auditor for consultation on the audited project expenditure acquittal.
- 8.2.4 The audited *project* expenditure acquittal must be in the form prescribed at **Attachment B**.

8.3 State, territory and local government must maintain appropriate records

- 8.3.1 State, territory and local governments must keep an accurate audit trail for seven (7) years from the end of the project.
- 8.3.2 The *Department* may, at any time, request documentation from *applicants* to evidence the state or territory government's compliance with any aspect of the *program*.
- 8.3.3 State and territory governments must make available to the *Department* within one (1) month all documentation relevant to a request by the *Department*.

9. Public acknowledgement of Commonwealth funding

9.1 Joint announcements of approved *projects*

- 9.1.1 The announcement of an approved *project* or *projects* must be through a joint media release, or other joint announcement, unless otherwise agreed by the *Department*.
- 9.1.2 The *Department* and state or territory *contact officer* must work together on the details of a joint media release or other joint announcement.
- 9.1.3 When referring to an approved *project*, it must be described as:
 - 'jointly funded by the Commonwealth and <u>^insert name of state</u> under the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program' or,
 - 'funded by the Commonwealth under the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program.'

9.2 Arrangements for subsequent communication opportunities

- 9.2.1 State and territory governments, through the *contact officer*, must reach prior agreement with the *Department* on the nature and content of any subsequent events, announcements, promotional material or publicity relating to the *project*. This includes but is not limited to:
 - any state or territory government media releases regarding the project or program
 - ceremonies related to the project or the specific flood mitigation infrastructure
 - media events that include reference to the project or program
 - plaques and signage related to the project and the specific flood mitigation infrastructure.

HELPING COMMUNITIES REBUILD AND RECOVER FROM NATURAL DISASTERS

MEDIA RELEASE

05 May 2021 Prime Minister, Minister for Agriculture, Drought and Emergency Management, Minister for the Environment

The Morrison Government will establish a new national agency to help support local communities respond to large-scale natural disasters and undertake new initiatives to manage the impact of future events and the changing climate.

The National Recovery and Resilience Agency will provide support to local communities during the relief and recovery phases following major disasters.

The new Agency will also provide advice to Government on policies and programs to mitigate the impact of future major disaster events.

Prime Minister Scott Morrison said \$600 million would be invested in a new program of disaster preparation and mitigation, managed by the new National Recovery and Resilience Agency.

"The new Agency will help communities rebuild and recover from natural disasters, helping many Australians in their greatest time of need, while strengthening our defences against future major disasters," the Prime Minister said.

"Immediate funding will support resilience projects across the community and for individuals' homes, such as bushfire and cyclone proofing houses, building levees and improving the resilience of telecommunications and essential supplies.

"In the past two years Australians have faced floods, bushfires, cyclones, drought and now the COVID-19 pandemic and I'm determined to keep Australians safe and support the recovery of communities and regions right across Australia."

The National Recovery and Resilience Agency will be led by Coordinator-General Shane Stone and bring together the former National Drought and North Queensland Flood Response and Recovery Agency and the National Bushfire Recovery Agency, including the \$2 billion National Bushfire Recovery Fund.

The Agency will also take responsibility for supporting the long-term recovery of communities rebuilding after the recent storms and floods in New South Wales and Queensland and cyclones in West Australia. Minister for Agriculture, Drought and Emergency Management David Littleproud said Emergency Management Australia will also receive support to upgrade their National Situation Room to include a real time 'common operating picture', for all natural disasters.

"We will also provide \$4.5 million to support disaster recovery scenario training to help regional communities prepare for high-risk hazards," Minister Littleproud said.

"This funding will provide accredited training for people working in disaster recovery and two pilot Resilience Hubs to coordinate regional training and capability development across all levels of government when responding to a natural disaster."

Minister Littleproud said the final, critically important part of these national reforms was the establishment of a world-class climate service with detailed climate and disaster information.

"Through the Australian Climate Service we will draw on the expertise of our best and brightest scientists to help us better anticipate, manage and adapt to climate impacts to inform the work of the National Recovery and Resilience Agency and Emergency Management Australia," he said.

"I am proud of the reforms to our federal emergency management architecture that have been announced today, along with the ongoing work to implement all of the Royal Commission's other recommendations.

"This national approach to policy reform will carry all the way through to peoples' front doors."

Minister for the Environment Sussan Ley said that the Australian Climate Service would strengthen Australia's position as a world leader in anticipating and adapting to the impacts of changing climates for decades to come.

"We do face more extreme weather events due to changing climate and this is about being prepared, and being able to take steps to make our communities more resilient," Minister Ley said.

"By bringing together critical data from the nation's key climate research institutions, the Australian Climate Service will not only help save lives and money through a more informed emergency response, it will inform long-term planning for infrastructure, housing and basic services like power, telecommunications, and water.

"It will help shape the way we build communities and underpin Australia's future adaptation strategies, including the new National Climate Resilience and Adaptation Strategy announced in January.

"The collaboration between the Bureau of Meteorology, the CSIRO, ABS and Geoscience Australia is critical to delivering rich insights drawn from an expanded range of data sources. "It will be further complemented by the Morrison Government's investments in adaptation and resilience through initiatives such as the National Environmental Science Program and Great Barrier Reef Restoration and Adaptation initiatives."

Methodology

During the panel discussion a number of criteria emerged which assisted the panel members with their assessment. These discussions were captured in the final Panel Assessment Spreadsheet. As a result 54 projects were not shortlisted based on the NFMIP eligibility criteria guidelines and additional considerations listed below:

- Projects relating to road works and upgrades that may be eligible to apply for funding under Department of Infrastructure road funding.
- Projects that could potentially receive support from another funding source.
- Projects relating to drainage/ storm water issues and general maintenance that can be managed by local council
 or state government.
- Projects that lacked evidence to support the claims in the application.
- Projects that lacked community consultation or did not demonstrate strong community flood mitigation benefits.
- Projects that did not meet the definition of an essential public asset.
- Projects that may hinder or conflict with already established Commonwealth emergency management initiatives.
- Projects that may be based on or result in poor urban planning, or may increase risk by opening up residential land in high risk flood zones.
- Projects that included beautification elements were clarified with the applicants, as the program should not fund any such elements.

\$50 million National Flood Infrastructure Initiative Building on Resilience

The Australian Government has today announced the establishment of a \$50 million National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Fund to help Australian communities to better prepare for extreme weather events and flooding.

The program has been established under the Emergency Response Fund and aligns with recommendations of the Royal Commission into National Natural Disaster Arrangements, the National Disaster Risk Reduction Framework, and findings of the State of the Climate Report 2020.

Minister for Emergency Management David Littleproud said the funding initiative will support state, territory and local governments to improve or construct essential public infrastructure to better withstand severe flood events.

"This initiative was determined by Emergency Management Australia (EMA) based on their consultations about the types of projects that could support the ERFs objectives.

"We need to adjust our approach from focusing on our emergency services responding to major flood events, to all sectors of the community, including all levels of government, helping prevent and mitigate disasters.

"The Government is committed to reducing the economic and social harm to Australian communities in flood prone or flood affected areas and this program will be a key part of our longer-term flood mitigation efforts."

"Beyond the ERF, the government is already investing more than \$2 billion in regions impacted by the 2019-20 Black Summer Bushfires, with a wide range of supports for individuals, communities, local councils and businesses for immediate and long-term relief and recovery," Minister Littleproud said.

Emergency Management Australia, within the Department of Home Affairs, will lead the delivery of the program, bringing together emergency management and infrastructure experts from across the Australian Government.

"Our communities continue to display extraordinary resilience in the face of consecutive disasters so this initiative will go a long way in making sure we're a step ahead when the next disaster hits.

"The successful projects will showcase the innovation, commitment and enthusiasm of our communities in assuring their safety from emergencies and disasters."

Money flowing to stop future flooding

The Australian Government is providing \$50 million for projects across the country under the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program, Minister for Emergency Management, David Littleproud, announced today.

The Australian Government will fund or co-fund 22 separate projects in each state and territory to assist our communities to prepare for future flood events.

"We're taking these steps to protect Australian communities, individuals and businesses from an increasingly complex natural hazard environment," Minister Littleproud said.

"Communities are going to see the benefits from this program through a reduction in the impacts of major flooding events, with additional benefits such as lower insurance costs and local job creation," he said.

"The funding for flood mitigation projects reflects the Australian Government's commitment to helping local communities prepare for major rainfall and flood events, such as those we witnessed in February and March this year.

I write to you to inform you that, in accordance with the requirements of the *Emergency Response Fund Act 2019* (ERF Act), I have determined the funding allocations for projects under the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (the Program) for 2021-22. This Program is funded from the \$50 million pre-disaster resilience component of the Emergency Response Fund (ERF), as previously approved by Cabinet and I am pleased to advise that the Government will allocate the full \$50 million available in 2021-22 to state and territory governments to fund or co-fund the delivery of 15 flood mitigation projects across the country.

As I have now approved the funding allocations, I therefore request that you direct the drawdown of \$50 million available from the ERF in 2021-22 to the COAG Account for this Program in accordance with sections 28A and 32A ERF ACT.

Enclosed is the Ministerial Direction to initiate the process to draw down the required funds from the ERF for 2021-22. I request that you forward it to your Department, at your earliest convenience, for action to ensure that the funding committed by the Government is available for delivery to state and territory governments before the end of the financial year, noting that the mandated allocations available from the ERF expire on 30 June.

As you are aware, this Program is a key initiative of the Australian Government's commitment to reducing economic and social harm to Australian communities in flood prone and flood affected areas. The second round of the Program has a renewed focus in targeting levees, levee systems, infrastructure to promote flood plain restoration and specific green infrastructure initiatives that mitigate flood risk.

The Treasury will distribute the funding allocations to state and territory governments once Schedules to the Federation Funding Arrangements (FFA) – Environment have been negotiated and finalised with each jurisdiction receiving funding through this Program. A grant with the state or territory government established under the FFAs complies with the requirements of Division 4 of the ERF Act.

If the funding is not drawn down before 30 June 2022, its access to this financial year's allocation expires under the ERF Act and the Program commitments will not be delivered.

- 1. This submission seeks your signature on the New South Wales Schedule in order to be included in the December 2021 pay run by Treasury.
- 2. On 21 June 2021, \$50 million was debited from the Emergency Response Fund (ERF) and credited to the COAG Reform Fund to fund the 22 projects approved for Commonwealth funding or co-funding under the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program 2020-21 (MS21-000528 and MS21-000571 refer).
- 3. The funding for the Australian Capital Territory, Queensland, South Australia and Western Australia was transferred by Treasury on 8 November 2012.
- 4. As previously advised, the funding will be delivered under Schedules to the Federation Funding Agreements Environment which require co-signature by you and the relevant minister from each state and territory. Once the bilateral arrangements for the delivery of the projects are finalised through the co-signature of Schedules, Treasury transfers the funds to jurisdictions.
- 5. On 20 August 2021, copies of the Schedule and a signed covering letter were sent from your office to the relevant states and territories seeking ministerial co-signatures.
- On 25 October 2021, you signed Schedules for Australian Capital Territory, Queensland, South Australia, and Western Australia and subsequently have signed the Victoria Schedule on 29 October 2021 and the Northern Territory and Tasmania Schedules on 5 November 2021.

- 9. Further delays in co-signature of the Schedule provided may not meet the deadlines for the November pay run to states and territories. This will invite scrutiny and further delay the commencement and delivery of the projects funded under this program.

Key Points:

 This Submission seeks your endorsement of bilateral agreements ('Schedules') with each state and territory to deliver Commonwealth grants arising from the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (NFMIP 2020 - 2021). The NFMIP 2020 - 2021 is funded through the \$50 million pre-disaster resilience component of the Emergency Response Fund ('ERF') available for disbursement for 2020-21.

Execution of Schedules and making of payments to each state and territory

- On 27 May 2021, the former Minister for Agriculture, Drought and Emergency Management, the Hon David Littleproud MP, approved the final funding allocations for projects under the NFMIP 2020 - 2021 (<u>Attachment B</u> refers) and wrote to his ministerial counterparts in each state and territory to advise them of these outcomes (<u>Attachment C</u> refers). Minister Littleproud also wrote to the Minister for Finance, Senator the Hon Simon Birmingham, providing the direction required under the *Emergency Response Fund Act* 2019 (ERF Act) to release \$50 million from the ERF in line with the project funding allocations.
- 3. Funding for each state and territory has been approved as a grant under s32A of the ERF Act, and will be provided under the Federation Funding Agreements framework (FFAs), negotiated by Treasury in 2020. The agreements between the Commonwealth and each jurisdiction are created as Schedules to the FFAs. The Schedules facilitate the transfer of funds to the jurisdictions and set the conditions for the delivery of funded projects as required by the NFMIP Program Guidelines.
- 4. The terms of each Schedule were negotiated separately between the Commonwealth and each state and territory government. Each Schedule, as well as a covering letter to the relevant state or territory Minister is included at <u>Attachments H through O</u> for your signature.
- 5. Following your endorsement, the Schedules will be provided to the relevant state or territory Minister for co-signing. The Schedule will commence as soon as the state or territory Minister co-signs the agreement.
- 6. Once the co-signed Schedules are returned to the Commonwealth, Treasury will transfer the funds to states and territories through normal payment mechanisms (expected on or around 9 September 2021). The funding will be transferred to each jurisdiction as a single, upfront payment and the funding will then be managed by the state or territory government with the entity responsible for delivering the project.

Audit and assurance

- 7. Audit, assurance, monitoring, reporting and acquittal requirements are set out in an Audit and Reporting Framework developed for projects funded under the NFMIP 2020 2021.
- 8. For each funded project, states and territories will provide to the Agency:
 - i. an Implementation Plan, no later than three months after the Schedule is signed,
 - ii. quarterly updates on Commonwealth funding expended,
 - iii. half-yearly updates and an end of project report on project timeframes, scope and budgetary overspends and underspends (including Commonwealth funding), and

- iv. an audit report which acquits all project expenditure, completed by the stateappointed auditor or a Certified Practising Accountant, no later than nine months from the end of the financial year in which the project was completed.
- 9. The terms of each Schedule set out the circumstances where the Commonwealth can seek to recover funds provided under the NFMIP.

Transfer of ERF and NFMIP to the National Recovery and Resilience Agency

- 10. On 5 May 2021, the Prime Minister, the Hon Scott Morrison MP, issued a joint media release with Minister Littleproud and the Minister for the Environment, the Hon Susan Ley MP, announcing the establishment of the Agency (Attachment D refers).
- 11. On 1 July 2021, policy authority for the ERF, including the NFMIP, transferred from Emergency Management Australia within the Department of Home Affairs to the Agency. The Department of Finance retains administering authority for the ERF Act.
- 12. Amendments to the ERF Act are currently being finalised to reflect this Machinery of Government change. These amendments will not impact your responsibilities as the Emergency Management Minister under the ERF Act.

Background

- 13. In accordance with the *ERF Act (Section 20 (1)(b),(c) and (f))*, the ERF may be used to provide a grant of financial assistance to carry out a project that is directed towards either or both of the following outcomes:
 - i. recovery from a natural disaster,
 - ii. post disaster resilience an area that has been affected (whether directly or indirectly) by a natural disaster, thereby building resilience to and reducing the risks of a future natural disaster; developing the long-term sustainability of a community at risk of being affected by a natural disaster.
- 14. Section 34 of the ERF Act prescribes an annual limit of up to \$50 million which may be drawn from the ERF each financial year to support the disaster resilience outcomes detailed at Paragraph 13 (ii) of this submission.
- 15. On 4 December 2020, Minister Littleproud wrote to the Prime Minister, the Hon Scott Morrison MP, seeking his agreement to draw \$50 million from the ERF in 2020-21 to deliver a national program to invest in priority flood mitigation infrastructure initiatives.
- 16. On 11 December 2020, Minister Littleproud announced the establishment of the NFMIP (<u>Attachment E</u> refers). Applications were open to state and territory governments from 21 December 2020 to 12 February 2021. On 10 May 2021, Minister Littleproud publicly announced the successful projects for Commonwealth funding or co-funding under this Program (<u>Attachment F</u> refers).
- 17. A detailed background on the establishment and administration of the NFMIP 2020- 2021 is provided at <u>Attachment A.</u>

Consultation - internal/external

- 18. Schedules were developed in close consultation with the Treasury, the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (PM&C), the Department of Finance (DoF), Emergency Management Australia, and the Agency. Each Schedule was separately negotiated with relevant counterparts in state and territory governments.
- 19. State and territory Governments, PM&C, DoF and the Treasury were consulted on the timeframes relating to approvals and the process under the FFAs.
- 20. DoF, Treasury, PM&C, the Australian Government Solicitor and Department of Home Affairs' Finance and Legal Divisions (servicing Emergency Management Australia) were consulted on process to draw down funds from the ERF and the development of the Ministerial Direction.
- 21. In consultation with Treasury, the Council on Federation Funding Relations (CFFR) was advised of this Program and the expected \$50 million in expenditure at the February and April 2021 meetings in accordance with National Cabinet requirements.

Key Issues

- On Friday, 11 December 2020, you announced the establishment of the Program. The Program draws on the \$50 million pre-disaster resilience component of the ERF available for allocation in 2020-21.
- State and Territory Governments, in consultation with Local Governments and the community, were eligible to apply for funding. The application period ran from 21 December 2020 to 12 February 2021. To assist applicants in preparing their applications, Program Guidelines setting out the Program's eligibility requirements and selection criteria were made available to applicants. A copy of the Guidelines is at <u>Attachment C</u>.
- 3. In total, 74 applications with a combined value of \$232 million were received, with representation from all States and Territories.
- 4. Assessment of the applications was undertaken by an interdepartmental Program Review Panel (the Panel), comprised of representatives from Departments of Home Affairs, Prime Minister & Cabinet, Treasury, Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications, the National Drought and North Queensland Flood Response and Recovery Agency, and the Bureau of Meteorology. The methodology for the assessment of applications is at <u>Attachment D</u>.
- 5. Assessed criteria include the proposal's relative impact on reducing the flood risk and impact on communities, and the proposal's capacity to lower household or Local Government insurance premiums. The priority of the application as nominated by each State and Territory, relative to other applications in their jurisdiction, was also a consideration.

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Extending the Program to a second round of flood mitigation funding

- 26. Noting the large number of applications received for flood mitigation funding, the Department recommends undertaking a second national flood mitigation infrastructure funding round, drawing on the \$50 million available from the ERF for allocation in 2021-22.
- 27. Flood infrastructure projects deliver significant value for the community and, relative to other disaster mitigation projects, provide a significant return on investment. Prioritising the development of flood mitigation infrastructure nationally is also recommended, given the potential threat to life and economic loss caused by flood events, as recently demonstrated in Western Australia and New South Wales.

- 29. A second flood mitigation funding round could also be conducted relatively quickly. The Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet has advised that should you wish to allocate ERF funds for a different program other than flood mitigation in 2021-22, Cabinet approval will be required. Should you wish to extend the program, authority to undertake another flood mitigation program may be sought via an exchange of letters with the Prime Minister.
- 30. Pending your agreement to extend the Program to a second round, and your agreement to Option 1, a letter to the Prime Minister to seek this authority is at <u>Attachment B</u>. Should you agree to Option 2 or other alternative options, a revised letter to the Prime Minister will be provided for your consideration.

Next Steps

31. Following your approval of projects for funding under the NFMIP, the Department will prepare letters from you for your signature to State and Territory emergency management ministers to inform them of the successful projects in their jurisdictions. The Department will then work with State and Territory Governments to develop bilateral agreements and determine project specific timeframes, including: funding delivery, estimated dates of completion, project delivery milestones, and audit and assurance mechanisms.

Development and Funding for an Indigenous Land Use Management Program

- 32. Given the substantial existing funding commitment in this policy area across Government, the ERF is not recommended as a suitable funding mechanism to support an Indigenous Land Management Program. The ERF Guidelines and legislation require that proposals for funding from the ERF should complement existing programs, but not replace other sources of funding, and there is already substantial Commonwealth expenditure in this space.
- 33. Commonwealth funding for an extension of the successful Indigenous Ranger grants program of \$762 million was announced in 2020 by the Minister for Indigenous Australians, the Hon Ken Wyatt AM, MP and the Minister for the Environment, the Hon Sussan Ley MP. Over the past 14 years, this program has strengthened Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples' connection to country while providing more than 2100 jobs and training opportunities in communities across Australia. This grants program is open only to existing registered ranger groups to continue their land and water management conservation efforts.
- 34. Consultation with NIAA indicates that provision of additional funding to land management in the context of the existing arrangements and quantum of investment is unlikely to yield demonstrable benefits in terms of on-the-ground risk reduction outcomes or in supporting Indigenous communities and rangers. More meaningful outcomes could be achieved by enabling a transition from the existing funding and program arrangements to a more coherent and strategic approach that build on the inherent skills and commercial self-sufficiency of Indigenous communities offering these services.
- 35. In order to transition to a more coherent and strategic approach, the Department proposes to develop a land use planning and disaster risk reduction pilot project in collaboration with the NIAA, science agencies (such as CSIRO) and relevant not-for-profit organisations.
- 36. Indigenous land management, also referred to as 'caring for Country', is undertaken by Indigenous individuals, groups and organisations across Australia for a range of customary, community, conservation and commercial reasons. This approach has economic, social and cultural benefits including building resilience to disasters.

- 37. Importantly, this systemic approach is in line with the National Disaster Risk Reduction Framework and would address Recommendations 18.1 and 18.2 of the Royal Commission into National Natural Disaster Arrangements.
- 38. Funding options exist to support a pilot program approach with a view to scaling up at the appropriate time and contingent on necessary resources. At present, and noting the limitations on the ERF, there is no suitable funding source for an additional moderate to large Indigenous program noting that this may also compete with existing Government measures.
- 39. Should you agree to pursue a pilot program, the Department will provide you with further advice on funding options which may include the use of the Disaster Resilience Australia Package and the national component of the disaster risk reduction funding package. This would enable a costed proposal for an evidence-based and scaled up program to come forward in the 2022 MYEFO.

Background

- 40. In accordance with the Emergency Response Fund Act 2019 (Section 20 (1)(c)-(f)) the ERF may be used to provide a grant of financial assistance to carry out a project that is directed towards achieving resilience to, preparedness for, or a reduction of risk of future disasters, or the long-term sustainability of a community in an area that is at risk of being affected by a natural disaster. Section 34 of the Act prescribes an annual limit of \$50 million which may be drawn from the Emergency Response Fund each financial year for this purpose.
- On 4 December 2020, you wrote to the Prime Minister seeking his agreement to draw \$50 million from the ERF in 2020-21 to deliver a national program to invest in priority flood mitigation infrastructure initiatives (MS20-003016 refers).
- 42. Under the Emergency Response Fund (ERF) Guidelines, the Director General of Emergency Management Australia is the Commonwealth Officer responsible for providing advice to the Minister for Emergency Management regarding use of the ERF.
- 43. State and Territory Governments, in consultation with Local Governments and the Community, were eligible to apply for funding. Applications opened on 21 December 2020 and closed on 12 February 2021. A total of 74 applications from eight jurisdictions totalling over \$232 million were received. A summary of the applications received is at <u>Attachment A</u>.

Consultation - internal/external

- 44. The Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet, Department of Finance, The Treasury, Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications, the National Drought and North Queensland Flood Response and Recovery Agency (NDNQFRRA), and the Bureau of Meteorology were consulted on the proposed funding options.
- 45. Legal Division, Finance Division, Emergency Management Australia (Recovery, Disaster Preparedness and Disaster Risk Reduction Branches), within the Department of Home Affairs were consulted on the development of this submission.
- 46. The Civil, Commercial and Employment Law Branch reviewed the assessment process for the grants program and have advised that based on the documents reviewed, they are comfortable that steps have been taken to mitigate probity and assurance risks.

Consultation – Secretary

44. The Secretary was not consulted on the approach in the submission.

Sensitivities

- 45. The release of the Australian National Audit Office Report 'Award of Funding under the Community Sport Infrastructure Program' on 15 January 2020 has brought increased scrutiny to the awarding of government grants. The report concluded that the award of grand funding in the Community Sports Infrastructure Program was not informed by appropriate assessment processes and sound advice. The report highlighted the importance of the program guidelines in deciding grant funding. In line with the grants management framework, and for probity reasons including equity and fairness to all applicants, merit-based funding decisions are recommended.
- 46. It is likely that a decision to fund projects that are not recommended by the Director General EMA or not in the merit order as assessed by the Program Review Panel would be open to scrutiny.
- 47. It is important that the States and Territories are notified of the successful projects in a coordinated manner to ensure they are all informed within the same timeframes. Applicants may have technical questions about the terms of their offer, including where the amount awarded is different from the amount requested. This best practice stakeholder management was also an area of focus in the Australian National Audit Office Report.

49. In accordance with our long standing practices, should you wish for unclassified media lines to be prepared in relation to this issue please contact the Home Affairs Media Coordination team – media@homeaffairs.gov.au.

Financial/systems/legislation/deregulation/media implications

- 50. The Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet has advised that should you wish to allocate ERF funds for a different program other than flood mitigation in 2021-22, Cabinet approval will be required. Should you wish to extend the program, authority to undertake another flood mitigation program may be sought via an exchange of letters with the Prime Minister.
- 51. There has been significant media interest in the Emergency Response Fund and the outcomes of this program.
- 52. The Department assesses that the list of recommended projects represent a proper use of Commonwealth resources and are consistent with associated legislation and guidelines, including: the Commonwealth Grants Rules and Guidelines; the Public Governance, Performance and Accountability Act 2013; Emergency Response Fund Act 2019; Emergency Response Fund Guidelines; and, the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program Guidelines.

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2. Overview

2.1 Purpose

- 2.1.1 These guidelines provide information on the administration of the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (the *program*). The intended users are the Australian Government, as the *program administrator*, and state and territory governments, as the intended *applicants*.
- 2.1.2 These guidelines may be updated at any time during the course of the *program* to provide further details as they arise, while maintaining the integrity and transparency of the program.
- 2.1.3 Queries regarding the program should be directed to national.flood.mitigation@homeaffairs.gov.au

2.2 Context

- 2.2.1 Many Australian communities are exposed to flooding, with varied impacts and damage that can be substantial and devastating. The Australian Government, in the State of the Climate 2020, reported that heavy rainfall events in Australia are becoming more intense, with an increase in the intensity of short-duration extreme rainfalls. Such events are associated with flash flooding and an increased risk to communities. Further, Deloitte Access Economics¹ found flooding to be the most costly natural hazard-related cause of disaster when both tangible and intangible losses are taken into account. However, for many households and communities the ability to reduce flood risk is beyond their control.
- 2.2.2 This *program* reflects the Australian Government's commitment to support impactful, national flood mitigation priorities through the provision of \$50 million in 2020-21 from the Emergency Response Fund. In line with National Priority 3: Enhanced investment of the *National Disaster Risk Reduction Framework*², the *program* will target high priority locally and nationally significant flood mitigation infrastructure activities, with a view to maximising broader social and economic outcomes, including through limiting future disaster recovery needs and costs.

2.3 Program purpose and outcomes

- 2.3.1 The *program* will contribute to, or pay for, the improvement or construction of *flood mitigation infrastructure* to support local communities mitigate their priority flood risks and reduce the impact of flood events.
- 2.3.2 The outcomes to be achieved through the *program* are:
 - reduction in the impact of future floods on a specific community or communities
 - reduction in the expected future eligible expenditure under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements 2018
 - positive change in the insurability of the existing flood mitigation infrastructure
 - addressing relevant household or local government insurance affordability as a result of the improvement or construction of the flood mitigation infrastructure
 - ancillary to the above, local job creation.

3. Timeframes

3.1 Delivery timeframes

- 3.1.1 Applications for the *program* will open on 21 December 2020, and **close at 5pm AEST on** 12 February 2021.
- 3.1.2 The Australian Government *project review panel* will assess applications in early 2021, with the intent to make a recommendation to the *Minister* and announce successful *projects* in March 2021.
- 3.1.3 Funding agreements with relevant state and territory governments will be established following this announcement, with the first milestone payment to be made prior to 30 June 2021.

3.2 Milestones

3.2.1 *Project* specific timeframes, including estimated date of completion, and delivery milestones will be determined with the relevant state and territory governments during the development of the bilateral agreement.

4. Funding and agreements

4.1 Funding source

- 4.1.1 The *program* is funded from the \$50 million component of the *Emergency Response Fund* and is made available through the *Council of Australian Governments* (COAG) Reform Fund.
- 4.1.2 The *Emergency Response Fund* is intended to complement existing sources of funding for relevant activities.

4.2 Allocation of funding

- 4.2.1 A maximum of \$50 million is available in 2020-21 for the *program*. Allocations will consider:
 - prioritisation of projects submitted by the state and territory government
 - availability of other Australian Government funding sources
 - relative flood risk and mitigation impact
 - reduction of relevant household or local government insurance premiums;
 - likelihood of project success, and
 - equitable share across all state and territory jurisdictions, where possible and reasonable.
- 4.2.2 There is no funding cap for each application or limit on the number of *applications* that can be submitted by a state or territory government.
- 4.2.3 A co-contribution from the state or territory government, and/or other appropriate funding partners is desirable but not essential.
- 4.2.4 The Department may provide funding for some or all of the estimated project costs.

4.3 Project funding agreements

4.3.1 Funding for successful *project* proposals will be provided to state and territory governments through the establishment of a relevant funding arrangement under *the Intergovernmental Agreement on Federal Financial Relations*.

5. Eligibility criteria

5.1 Application form criteria

- 5.1.1 An *application* will only be deemed valid for assessment if the application:
 - is made using the provided Application Form (see Attachment A)
 - is complete with all particulars
 - is submitted by a state or territory government agency
 - · demonstrates support by the relevant state or territory emergency management minister
 - is provided to the Department via email at national.flood.mitigation@homeaffairs.gov.au, and
 - is provided to the Department by 5pm AEST 12 February 2021.

5.2 Only a state or territory government may apply for program funding

- 5.2.1 Only a state or territory government may apply for *program* funding. However, a state or territory government may use a third party to deliver the *project* on its behalf, including through the procurement of a commercial service provider or through funding a local government.
- 5.2.2 This does not diminish the responsibility of state and territory governments to assure and audit the project's preservation of eligibility, integrity and expenditure. Further details are at Section 8: Audit and Assurance.
- 5.2.3 Interested local governments with eligible *projects* should contact their state or territory government's emergency management agency to discuss the state or territory government's support for and submission of that *project* on the local government's behalf.

5.3 Only flood mitigation infrastructure may be eligible for program funding

- 5.3.1 Flood mitigation infrastructure is an essential public asset, as defined in the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements 2018, with the primary purpose of reducing the risk of flood to, and/or impact of flooding on, a community or communities.
- 5.3.2 Eligible infrastructure may include, but is not limited to: dams, levees, bridges, culverts and other drainage systems, rainfall and river height measurement systems, weather radar systems and flood warning infrastructure, where that infrastructure appropriately meets the definition of *flood* mitigation infrastructure.
- 5.3.3 Flood mitigation infrastructure may also include non-physical components, such as specific information technologies, that in their absence would render the flood mitigation infrastructure wholly inoperable.
- 5.3.4 State and territory governments are responsible for assessing and demonstrating that the infrastructure is *flood mitigation infrastructure* in accordance with paragraphs 5.3.1 to 5.3.3 above.
 - Such evidence may include businesses cases, flood mitigation strategies and other supporting documentation that demonstrates eligibility.

5.4 A project must be for the improvement of an existing or construction of a new flood mitigation infrastructure

5.4.1 State and territory governments may apply for *program* funding to support the improvement of an existing or the construction of a new *flood mitigation infrastructure*.

- 5.4.2 The improvement of an existing, or the construction of new, *flood mitigation infrastructure* must have an outcome of reducing flood risk to, **and** the impact of flood on, a specific community or communities, **and** at least one of the following outcomes:
 - reduction in expected future eligible expenditure under the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements 2018
 - material improvement in the insurability of the existing flood mitigation infrastructure, and/or
 - addresses relevant household or local government insurance affordability as a result of the *flood* mitigation infrastructure.
- 5.4.3 State and territory governments are required to provide assurance to the Australian Government that the evidence supporting claims of the achievability of relevant outcomes are authoritative and can be relied on.

5.5 State and territory governments must consult with local governments and communities

- 5.5.1 State and territory governments are required to consult with, and evidence the consultation with, relevant local governments and/or community or communities on the need for and decision to implement the specific *flood mitigation infrastructure project*.
- 5.5.2 State and territory governments may draw on consultation previously undertaken with appropriate local governments and/or community or communities, where it can be demonstrated that the consultation is relevant and that the outcomes of this consultation remain unchanged.

5.6 State and territory government must indicate the relevant priority of projects

- 5.6.1 State and territory governments are required to disclose and evidence each *project's* relative priority within the state or territory and why each *project* has been submitted for *program* funding.
- 5.6.2 If a state or territory government is submitting multiple applications, each *project* must be prioritised within that group of applications.
- 5.6.3 The framework for determining prioritisation must be clearly articulated to allow for a national level assessment of relative priority across multiple states and territories.

5.7 Processes for estimating cost of projects

- 5.7.1 Consistent with the *Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements*³, the estimated *project* costs must be determined though:
 - a market response, or
 - cost estimation.
- 5.7.2 If 'market response' is the selected method, the applicable procurement processes must be followed when requesting pricing from the market.
- 5.7.3 If cost estimation is the selected method, states must verify the estimated construction cost by:
 - using an internal engineer or quantity surveyor with the appropriate level of expertise and experience, or

 engaging an independent engineer or quantity surveyor with the appropriate level of expertise and experience.

5.8 Project cost exclusions

- 5.8.1 Estimated and actual project costs must not include:
 - costs already incurred by the *applicant* or a local government, in the <u>delivery</u> of a *project* or application associated with this *program*
 - costs already incurred or expected to be incurred by the *applicant* or a local government, in the <u>development</u> of a *project* or *application* associated with this *program*,
 - costs already incurred by any party in relation to the maintenance, improvement or construction
 of the relevant flood mitigation infrastructure
 - the cost of the acquisition of land or property.
- 5.9 State and territory governments must disclose other project funding sources and amounts
- 5.9.1 State and territory governments must disclose all *project* funding sources and amounts provided or committed in relation to the *flood mitigation infrastructure*.
- 5.9.2 State and territory governments are also required to disclose whether and how *projects* will be delivered if the full funding request is not available through the *program*.

5.10 Only projects that do not have an existing full funding commitment are eligible for program funding

5.10.1 *Projects* where the *program* funding would be used to replace funding already committed to the *project* from other sources are not eligible under this *program*.

6. Application and assessment processes

6.1 Application process

- 6.1.1 Applications must be approved by the respective state or territory government emergency management minister prior to submission to the *Minister*. Evidence of this approval should be submitted with the *application*.
- 6.1.2 Completed *applications* are to be provided to the *Minister*, through the *Department*, by <u>5pm AEDT on</u> <u>12 February 2021</u>.
- 6.1.3 Applications must be submitted using the Application Form template at Attachment A.
- 6.1.4 The Australian Government reserves the right to discuss the *application* or *project* and request additional information from the state or territory government through the *contact officer*.

6.2 Program Review Panel

- 6.2.1 The program review panel will consist of members of the Department, and other key Commonwealth agencies, as agreed by the Director General Emergency Management Australia. The program review panel will be chaired by a member of the Department delegated by the Director General Emergency Management Australia, being the Commonwealth official responsible for making recommendations to the Minister concerning the use of funding, in accordance with the Emergency Response Fund Guidelines.
- 6.2.2 *Program review panel* members will cover a range of relevant subject matter knowledge and expertise to ensure that:
 - projects and/or the program complement other Australian Government programs; and
 - there is no alternative funding source or duplication of proposals.
- 6.2.3 The *program review panel* will be responsible, where necessary, for substantiating with *applicants* any claims associated with flood risk, disaster recovery funding, insurance, and community impact where the evidence provided by an *applicant* is considered insufficient.
- 6.2.4 The Australian Government, through the *program review panel*, reserves the right to engage the services of a subject matter expert or representative from a non-government organisation, if required.
- 6.2.5 Allocations may also consider the advice of, and data provided by, Commonwealth agencies, such as the Bureau of Meteorology and the CSIRO.

6.3 Assessment principles

- 6.3.1 To ensure consistency, a predetermined assessment matrix, which refers to the eligibility and assessment criteria outlined in these *guidelines* will be used by the *program review panel*.
- 6.3.2 Assessment against this matrix will result in *applications* receiving a weighted score, which will be used to inform funding allocation decisions.

6.4 Equity principles

- 6.4.1 To ensure an equitable and transparent distribution of funds, allocations will be made based on the merit of each individual *application*.
- 6.4.2 Consideration will be given to the equitable distribution of the *program* funds to ensure all state and territory governments have an opportunity to receive support for their priority initiative.

6.4.3 'Equitable distribution' does not mean an equal distribution of program funds.

6.5 Decision making

- 6.5.1 The *Minister* is responsible for making decisions about *projects* to receive *program* funding and the amount of *program* funding to be allocated to a *project*.
- 6.5.2 Advice to the *Minister* on the projects recommended to receive program funding will be provided by the Director General of Emergency Management Australia, informed by the *program review panel*. The *Minister* may take into account other advice as appropriate.

6.6 Probity

- 6.6.1 The *Department* will administer the *program* with fairness, transparency, contestability and accountability.
- 6.6.2 The *Department* will ensure equality of access to information by developing a regularly updated guidance document that in response to relevant queries submitted to the Department.

7. Monitoring and reporting

7.1 Project reporting

- 7.1.1 State and territory governments must undertake regular monitoring and reporting in line with the project-by-project requirements outlined in the bilateral agreement.
- 7.1.2 The Australian Government may request additional information and/or reporting, outside the agreed milestones, if deemed necessary.
- 7.1.3 *Project* reporting will be considered as supporting documentation during the audit and assurance process.

8. Audit and assurance

8.1 *Program* assurance is informed by the *Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements* 2018 state assurance activities⁴

- 8.1.1 The objectives of the *program* assurance activities are to provide the Commonwealth with reasonable assurance over:
 - each state or territory government's Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements Management System, as it relates to state and territory government controls for:
 - market response
 - cost estimation
 - the eligibilitγ and integrity of the expenditure included in the *project* expenditure acquittal form.
- 8.1.2 The *Department* will confirm, and the state or territory government must provide a copy of, the relevant assurance report provided for the purposes of the *Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements* 2018⁵.

8.2 State and territory government are required to submit an audit report to acquit the project

- 8.2.1 State and territory governments in receipt of *program* funding are required to submit an audited *project* expenditure acquittal to the *Department* no later than <u>nine months from the end of the financial year</u> (that is, for the audit of the period 1 July 2020 30 June 2021, the audit report is due no later than 31 March 2022) in which the project was completed, unless otherwise specified in the funding agreement. This timeframe is consistent with the *Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements*.
- 8.2.2 State and territory governments must engage the services of a *state appointed auditor* to undertake the audit activity.
- 8.2.3 On request from the Department, the *state appointed auditor* must be available to the *Department* or its auditor for consultation on the audited project expenditure acquittal.
- 8.2.4 The audited *project* expenditure acquittal must be in the form prescribed at Attachment B.

8.3 State, territory and local government must maintain appropriate records

- 8.3.1 State, territory and local governments must keep an accurate audit trail for seven (7) years from the end of the project.
- 8.3.2 The *Department* may, at any time, request documentation from *applicants* to evidence the state or territory government's compliance with any aspect of the *program*.
- 8.3.3 State and territory governments must make available to the *Department* within one (1) month all documentation relevant to a request by the *Department*.

9. Public acknowledgement of Commonwealth funding

9.1 Joint announcements of approved projects

- 9.1.1 The announcement of an approved *project* or *projects* must be through a joint media release, or other joint announcement, unless otherwise agreed by the *Department*.
- 9.1.2 The *Department* and state or territory *contact officer* must work together on the details of a joint media release or other joint announcement.
- 9.1.3 When referring to an approved *project*, it must be described as:
 - 'jointly funded by the Commonwealth and ^insert name of state^ under the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program' or,
 - 'funded by the Commonwealth under the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program.'

9.2 Arrangements for subsequent communication opportunities

- 9.2.1 State and territory governments, through the *contact officer*, must reach prior agreement with the *Department* on the nature and content of any subsequent events, announcements, promotional material or publicity relating to the *project*. This includes but is not limited to:
 - any state or territory government media releases regarding the project or program
 - ceremonies related to the project or the specific flood mitigation infrastructure
 - media events that include reference to the project or program
 - plaques and signage related to the project and the specific flood mitigation infrastructure.

As a result 54 projects were not shortlisted based on the NFMIP eligibility criteria guidelines and additional considerations listed below:

- Projects relating to road works and upgrades that may be eligible to apply for funding under Department of Infrastructure road funding.
- Projects that could potentially receive support from another funding source.
- Projects relating to drainage/ storm water issues and general maintenance that can be managed by local council
 or state government.
- Projects that lacked evidence to support the claims in the application.
- Projects that lacked community consultation or did not demonstrate strong community flood mitigation benefits.
- Projects that did not meet the definition of an essential public asset.
- Projects that may hinder or conflict with already established Commonwealth emergency management initiatives.
- Projects that may be based on or result in poor urban planning, or may increase risk by opening up residential land in high risk flood zones.
- Projects that included beautification elements were clarified with the applicants, as the program should not fund any such elements.

Key Points:

- This brief is seeking your signature on Schedules to the Federation Funding Agreements 1. (FAA) to enable delivery of projects approved by the former minister under the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (NFMIP) (2021-22). The program provides funding to the states and territories to contribute to or pay for the improvement or construction of flood mitigation infrastructure. This follows the first \$50 million round of the program in 2020-21.
- 2. On 30 March 2022, the former Minister for Emergency Management and National Recovery and Resilience, approved \$50 million in funding for 15 projects across seven states and territories under the NFMIP 2021-22 (refer sample letter at Attachment O). No projects were approved in Western Australia. A list of the 15 projects approved is at Attachment P.

3. The former minister also wrote to former Minister for Finance, seeking the direction required under the *Emergency Response Fund Act* 2019 (ERF Act) to release \$50 million from the ERF in line with the project funding allocations. The \$50 million was drawn down from the Emergency Response Fund on 6 May 2022 and is available for transfer to the states and territories.

Execution of Schedules

- 4. The bilateral agreements (Schedules) with seven states and territories to deliver Commonwealth grants arising from the NFMIP (2021-22) require your signature. The NFMIP 2021-22 is funded through the \$50 million pre-disaster resilience component of the Emergency Response Fund (ERF) available in 2021-22.
- 5. Funding for each state and territory has been approved as a grant under s32A of the ERF Act, and will be provided under the FFA, negotiated by the Treasury in 2020. The agreements between the Commonwealth and each jurisdiction are created as Schedules to the FFA. The Schedules facilitate the transfer of funds to the states and territories and set the conditions for the delivery of funded projects as required by the NFMIP 2021-22 Program Guidelines.
- 6. The terms of each Schedule have been negotiated between the National Recovery and Resilience Agency (NRRA) and the relevant state and territory government agencies. Each Schedule, in addition to a covering letter to the relevant state or territory minister, is included at <u>Attachments A to N</u> for your signature.
- 7. When the co-signed Schedules are returned to the Commonwealth by the states and territories, the Treasury will transfer the funds as a single, upfront payment to the states and territories through usual payment mechanisms. The funding will then be managed by the state or territory government with the entity responsible for delivering the project.
- 8. The funding has already been drawn down from the ERF, and there is no requirement for the funding to be paid before a certain date ie there is no legislated time limit on the negotiation and disbursement processes. That said, payment as soon as practicable will assist timely delivery of projects.
- 9. When the executed Schedules are returned, they will be processed for payment through the Treasury's scheduled monthly pay run.

Audit and reporting

- Audit, assurance, monitoring, reporting and acquittal requirements are set out in an Audit and Reporting Framework developed for projects funded under the NFMIP 2021-22 (Attachment Q refers).
- 11. Under the Audit and Reporting Framework, states and territories are required to provide an Implementation Plan no later than three months after the Schedule is signed and regular reports demonstrating progress against agreed project milestones and outcomes in the Implementation Plan.
- 12. The NRRA will review and approve the Implementation Plans, given their administrative nature.
- 13. The terms of each Schedule set out the circumstances where the Commonwealth can seek to recover funds provided under the NFMIP.

- 14. A detailed background on the establishment and administration of the NFMIP program is provided at Attachment R.
- State and territory governments, in consultation with local governments and the community, were eligible to apply. The application period opened on 30 November 2021 and closed 4 February 2022.
- 16. 37 applications were received, for a total funding request of \$86.35 million, with representation from all states and territories.

- 20. On Thursday 24 February 2022, the Program Review Panel comprised of representatives from the Department of Agriculture, Water and Environment, Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications, the Bureau of Metrology and the National Recovery and Resilience Agency (Chair) who assessed, rated and ranked the 18 projects against the Program Guidelines and Assessment Criteria.
- 21. On 25 February 2022 the eligible projects were endorsed by the Coordinator-General and were provided to the former minister for their consideration and approval, as the decision maker for grants made from the Emergency Response Fund under the *Emergency Response Fund Act 2019*.

Consultation

22. The Schedules were developed in consultation with the Treasury, the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (PM&C), and the Department of Finance (DoF). Each Schedule was separately negotiated with the relevant state and territory department.

23. DoF, Treasury, PM&C, and the Australian Government Solicitor were consulted on the process to draw down funds from the ERF and the development of the Ministerial Direction.

24. The NRRA Media Coordination team will work with your office to draft joint media releases with each state and territory following their signing of the Schedules.

Background on the establishment and administration of the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program

On 11 December 2020, the former Minister for Agriculture, Drought and Emergency Management, the Hon David Littleproud MP announced the establishment of the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (NFMIP). The NFMIP provides funding to the states and territories to contribute to or pay for the improvement or construction of flood mitigation infrastructure. This supports local communities mitigate their priority flood risks and reduce the impact of future flood events.

The NFMIP is funded under the Emergency Response Fund (ERF), which was established on the commencement of the *Emergency Response Fund Act 2019* (the ERF Act) on 12 December 2019, allows the Government to draw up to:

- \$50 million each financial year to build resilience to, and prepare for or reduce the risk of future natural disasters.
- \$150 million each financial year to fund emergency response and recovery following natural disasters in Australia that have a significant or catastrophic impact, when the Government determines that existing recovery programs are insufficient to meet the scale of the response required.

The NFMIP program draws on the \$50 million pre-disaster resilience component of the ERF. Two rounds of the NFMIP program have been undertaken, 2020-21 and 2021-22, each drawing on the \$50 million pre-disaster resilience component of the ERF in the relevant year.

Transfer of ERF and NFMIP to the National Recovery and Resilience Agency (NRRA) On 5 May 2021, the former Prime Minister, the Hon Scott Morrison MP, issued a joint media release with the former Minister Littleproud and the former Minister for the Environment, the Hon Susan Ley MP, announcing the establishment of the NRRA.

On 1 July 2021, policy authority for the ERF, including the NFMIP, transferred from Emergency Management Australia within the Department of Home Affairs to the NRRA. The Department of Finance retains administering authority for the ERF Act.

In accordance with the ERF Act (Section 20 (1)(b),(c) and (f)), the ERF may be used to provide a grant of financial assistance to carry out a project that is directed towards either or both of the following outcomes:

- i. recovery from a natural disaster,
- ii. post disaster resilience an area that has been affected (whether directly or indirectly) by a natural disaster, thereby building resilience to and reducing the risks of a future natural disaster; developing the long-term sustainability of a community at risk of being affected by a natural disaster.

Eligibility

Eligibility requirements are set out in the Program Guidelines for each funding program. State and territory governments, in consultation with local governments and the community, were eligible to apply for funding for improvement of an existing or construction of a new flood mitigation infrastructure. Flood mitigation infrastructure is defined as an essential public asset having the primary purpose of reducing the risk of flood to, and/or impact of flooding on, a community or communities.

Eligible infrastructure included but was not limited to: dams, levees, bridges, culverts and other drainage systems, rainfall and river height measurement systems, weather radar systems and flood warning infrastructure.

Application and Assessment process

The application and assessment processes are set out in the Program Guidelines for each funding program. In each program, State and Territory Governments submitted their application by completing the application form provided in the Program Guidelines, along with endorsement from their respective state or territory government emergency management minister.

Applications were assessed by a Technical Review Panel and Program Review Panel (the Panel) comprised of representatives from the relevant Commonwealth Government agencies and departments. The Panel assessed each application against the eligibility and assessment criteria set out in the Guidelines before funding recommendations were made to the Minister.

Mechanism for delivering funds to States and Territories

Negotiation of grant agreements ('Schedules')

Funding from the NFMIP is supplied to states and territories as a 'grant' under section 32A of the ERF Act. The grant is provided through the Federation Funding Agreements (FFAs) negotiated by Treasury in 2020 to provide a consistent mechanism for payments to the states and territories.

The agreement between the Commonwealth and each jurisdiction is created through the co-signing of Schedules to the FFAs. The Schedules facilitate the transfer of funds to the jurisdictions and set the conditions for the delivery of funded projects as required by the Program Guidelines. The Schedules are co-signed by the Commonwealth and state or territory portfolio ministers responsible for emergency management, and funding can be transferred to the jurisdiction once the Schedules are signed by both parties.

Release of payments

When the Minister responsible for emergency management decides that a grant of financial assistance should be made to a state or territory, that minister issues a direction that provides for the funds to be debited from the Emergency Response Fund Special Account and credited to the COAG Reform Fund, in preparation to be transferred to the jurisdictions.

Funding relating to each Schedule will be transferred to the jurisdictions as a single, upfront payment with the conditions in the Schedule include setting out requirements relating to reporting, milestone payments, and audit and assurance.

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Background

PURPOSE OF THIS DOCUMENT

The objectives of this Audit and Reporting Framework (Framework) for the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (NFMIP) 2021-22 are to:

- provide the National Recovery and Resilience Agency (Agency) with reasonable assurance regarding implementation of each state and territory's NFMIP 2021-22 projects.
- provide the Agency with reasonable assurance regarding state expenditure included in the Financial Statement Form;
- inform the Agency's biannual reporting through Interim and Performance Reporting; and
- direct States and Territories to engage the services of a state or territory appointed auditor to undertake the assurance activities.

This document outlines the reporting requirements States and Territories are expected to meet under NFMIP, including the types of information required and the frequency of reporting.

RELATIONSHIP TO NFMIP 2021-22 PROGRAM GUIDELINES

This document gives effect to Section 12.2: 'Reporting' of the NFMIP Program Guidelines. Where there is a discrepancy between the information in the Program Guidelines and this document, this document supersedes the Program Guidelines.

EXPECTATIONS OF STATE AND TERRITORY GOVERNMENTS

State and Territory Governments must have systems in place to meet their data collection and reporting obligations outlined in the Schedule with the Agency for NFMIP 2021-22.

States and Territories must keep an accurate audit trail for seven (7) years. This must include written records that correctly record and explain the state's expenditure claimed for all eligible measures against the Schedule.

State and Territory Governments are expected to submit deliverables on the due dates outlined in the Schedule to the Federal Financial Relations Agreement – Environment via the Agency's online reporting portal. The information to be provided in these reports is summarised in this document.

If there are any changes proposed to project scope or implementation plan during the project period, State and Territory Governments must notify and discuss this with the Agency.

Summary of Reporting Requirements

State and Territory Governments receiving funding for projects under NFMIP 2021-22 are required to provide the below reports. Due dates for the reports are stated in the Schedule to the Federal Financial Relations Agreement – Environment.

REQUIREMENTS

- 1. Implementation Plan (refer Appendix A) to be provided within 3 months of the commencement of the Schedule.
- Performance Reports (refer Appendix B) to be provided biannual (twice per year) to report on
 progress against agreed project milestones and outcomes in the implementation plan. These reports will
 also include details of expenditure to date. The first Performance Report should be submitted
 approximately 3 months after the Implementation (i.e. around 6 months of the commencement of the
 Schedule).
- Final Report (refer Appendix C) to be provided no later than three months from the date that the project was completed. Final reports must identify if and how outcomes have been achieved and identify the total eligible expenditure incurred.
- 4. Audit Report States and Territories are required to submit to the Agency an audit report of all actual project expenditure at the end of the project, completed by the state appointed auditor. This should be attached to the Final Report (refer Appendix C).
 - This audit must comply with the requirements of ASA 800 Special Considerations-Audits of Financial Reports Prepared in Accordance with Special Purpose Frameworks.
 - The auditor's opinion is to be based on the indicative total actual expenditure that the State or Territory Government has set out in the End of Project Report.
 - The audit report must cover the total actual costs of the project, including any additional costs incurred against the project above the estimated project cost.
 - The report must be submitted no later than nine months from the end of the financial year in which the project was completed.
 - Where more than one project has been completed within the same financial year the state appointed auditor may report on all applicable projects within a single report.

Important Notes regarding financial expenditure

- States and Territories <u>must</u> keep an accurate audit trail for seven (7) years. This must include written
 records that correctly record and explain expenditure claimed for all eligible measures against the
 Schedule.
- In the event where efficiencies or overspends are identified, State and Territory governments will need to outline the jurisdiction's approach for determining how to reallocate funds. Section 20 of the Federal Financial Relations Act 2009 provides the Agency with discretion to determine that a State or Territory repay NFMIP Project funding to the Agency where the State or Territory does not meet a condition of the relevant Schedule.



 The Agency will determine whether an amount should be repaid, and if so, how much should be repaid, with regard to the circumstances of each individual matter. The Schedule sets out the circumstances in which the State or Territory must repay amounts to the Agency.

OTHER ITEMS

The Agency also reserves the right to request the following:

Ad hoc reports and meetings – throughout the project period, the Agency may ask States and Territories for adhoc reports or updates on their funded projects, or may arrange meetings to discuss the project. This may occur more frequently in the early stages of the project. Ad-hoc reports and meetings provide an opportunity to provide an update on progress, discuss any significant delays or difficulties in completing the project, discuss events and announcements related to the project, or discuss assumptions and objectives of the project(s).

Financial Declaration – on occasion, the Agency may ask States and Territories to provide a declaration that the funding was spent in accordance with the funding agreement and to report on any underspends of the funding.

- (9) While third parties are not signatories to this Schedule, States and Territories are solely responsible for ensuring third party compliance with the Emergency Response Fund Act, the Emergency Response

Fund Guideline, NFMIP Program Guidelines and the conditions of this Schedule.
Repayment of amounts to the Commonwealth
(10) In accordance with s21(4) of the Emergency Response Fund Act, the Commonwealth reserves the right to recover an amount provided under this Schedule, where

- (7) The content requirements of reporting under this Schedule are set out in the Audit and Reporting Framework
 - a. This resource supersedes and replaces chapter 7 (Monitoring and reporting), chapter 8 (Audit and assurance) and <u>Attachment B</u> of the NFMIP Program Guideline.

Third parties

- (8) In line with the NFMIP Program Guidelines, States and Territories may engage a third party to support the delivery of a project under this Schedule.
- (9) While third parties are not signatories to this Schedule, States and Territories are solely responsible for ensuring third party compliance with the Emergency Response Fund Act, the Emergency Response Fund Guideline, NFMIP Program Guidelines and the conditions of this Schedule.

Repayment of amounts to the Commonwealth

(10) In accordance with s21(4) of the Emergency Response Fund Act, the Commonwealth reserves the right to recover an amount provided under this Schedule, where
a. A project cannot be delivered according to the specifications in the relevant implementation plan and the project cannot be appropriately scaled, and
 b. the Commonwealth and State and Territory cannot reach an agreement on how to reallocate the funds, or
c. another condition of this Schedule is not met.
(11) The Commonwealth will determine whether an amount should be repaid, and if so, how much should be repaid, with regard to the circumstances of each matter.

- 1. In line with your decision for the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (NFMIP) 2021-22 (MS-000954 refers), the \$50 million component of the Emergency Response Fund will fund levees, levee systems, infrastructure to promote floodplain restoration and specific green infrastructure projects.
- 2. The Australian Government is investing \$100 million over 2020-21 and 2021-22 in the NFMIP to target high priority locally and nationally significant flood mitigation priorities in all states and territories. The 2021-22 NFMIP commitment demonstrates the Australian Government's strong leadership and positive commitment to reducing the high impact of the most costly natural disaster floods.

- This proposal seeks your endorsement of the 2021-22 Guidelines to announce another \$50 million in funding for flood mitigation infrastructure under the Emergency Response Fund (<u>Attachment A</u> refers).
- 4. Publication by mid-November on the National Recovery and Resilience Agency (NRRA) website of the 2021-22 Guidelines will maximise the time available for jurisdictions to work with local governments and other key stakeholders to prepare quality, evidence based applications.
- 5. The Agency has notified states and territories on the changes to the 2021-22 Guidelines at <u>Attachment B</u> noting jurisdictions need to provide their top **10** projects under the one application.
- 6. Applications for NFMIP 2021-22 closes 4 February 2022. Pending the number of applications received, flexibility may be required around timeframes in relation to the assessment period. The NRRA will work with your office on arrangements for announcing the successful projects under the program in April 2022 (MS21-000594 refers).

NFMIP Program Guidelines

- 7. The NRRA has developed the Program Guidelines that outline eligibility criteria, application process requirements and the assessment and decision making framework for the NFMIP.
- 8. Key improvements for the 2021-22 NFMIP include:
 - a. Refining the eligibility criteria in line with your agreement in MS-000954 (<u>Attachment B</u> refers).
 - b. Funding recipients must have systems in place to meet their data collection and reporting obligations outlined in their funding agreement:
 - i. Quarterly reports provided in line with the funding agreement.
 - qualitative and quantitative progress against agreed project milestones and outcomes,
 - expenditure of the funding and contributions of participants directly related to the project set out in the 2021-22 Guidelines,
 - ii. Ad-hoc reports on funded projects on request that:
 - update on progress,
 - report any significant delays, or
 - difficulties in completing the project.
 - iii. A final report on completion of the project.
 - c. Mandating that applicants co-contribute to projects to ensure state and territory governments are committed to the projects as a flood mitigation priority for the region in question.
 - d. Minimum co-contribution (financial and/or in-kind) per project set at 25 per cent of total estimated project costs, to maximise the impact and equitable spread of Program outcomes.
 - e. Reliable and detailed evidence of co-contribution commitment to be submitted at time of application.

- 9. The 2021-22 Program additionally retains best practice elements of the 2020-21 Program, reconfigured to suit the 2021-22 Program as follows:
 - States and territories are the sole eligible applicants for the 2021-22 Program, at benefit to program governance and accountability, since states and territories are responsible for program delivery and audit and assurance, subject to NRRA oversight.
 - States and territories will work with local government to identify and assist in the development of project applications.
 - In compliance with the *Emergency Response Fund Act 2019*, (the Act) the Commonwealth will develop, with each state and territory, separate Schedules under the Federation Funding Arrangements Framework (FFAF) to support accountable delivery of 2021-22 Program outcomes.
 - Under the Act, the annual ERF allocation expires at 30 June 2021. Funded projects must be determined by April 2022, to provide the estimated six week period required for funds drawdown from the ERF to the COAG Reform Fund.
 - Following execution of a state or territory FFAF Schedule for the 2021-22 Program, Treasury will disburse nominated ERF funds from the COAG Reform Fund to that state or territory as a single upfront payment.

Critical timing and next steps

- 10. Once you approve the 2021-22 Guidelines at <u>Attachment A</u>, arrangements will be made with your office on announcement opportunities. To coincide with the opening of the NFMIP, guidelines will be available on the NRRA website on the same day as the announcement. Prior to the announcement the NRRA will advise the Department of the Prime Minister and Cabinet (PM&C) Web Services who require a three working days to upload the Guidelines and application form. On completion of the upload, an announcement can be made with Guidelines and the application form going live on the same day.
- 11. Once the NFMIP is announced, the NRRA will write to states and territories enclosing the Guidelines and advising they:
 - provide documentary evidence that they have consulted with the Australian Local Government Association about the availability of the NFMIP, and
 - prioritise the ranking of their projects to align with those in the National Disaster Risk Reduction Framework, which will allow a national-level assessment of relative priority across states and territories.

Background

- 12. Flood mitigation in Australia suffers currently from under investment, and the Government recognises that floods are the most costly natural disaster, and flood mitigation is a high impact investment which aligns with the recommendations of both:
 - the Royal Commission into National Natural Disaster Arrangements, and
 - the Productivity Commission Report on Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements.

13. NFMIP 2020-21 was heavily subscribed with over \$231 million in (74) applications received. The second round of the NFMIP will build on the success of the program last financial year. The commitment for further funding demonstrates the Commonwealth's strong leadership while adopting a collaborative approach with the states and territories, noting that states, territories, and local governments retain primary responsibility for ensuring flood mitigation preparedness.

Consultation

14. NRRA Media and Finance, the Department of Finance, the Treasury, the Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications, the Department of Home Affairs, PM&C, the Department of Agriculture, Water and Environment and the Bureau of Meteorology have been consulted on the development of the 2021-22 Guidelines.

Financial/systems/legislation/deregulation/media implications

- 15. Under the Act, ERF funds must be accessed within the financial year and therefore transferred to the COAG Reform Fund or the relevant Special Account by the end of the financial year; 30 June 2022. The process to drawdown ERF funds requires six weeks approximately and can only be initiated upon final determination of projects to be funded under the 2021-22 Program.
- 16. The NRRA will work with your office on arrangements for announcing the Program, publication of the 2021-22 Guidelines and the opening of the applications.

- 1. On Tuesday, 30 November 2021, you announced the opening of the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (the Program) 2021-22. The Program is funded by the full \$50 million pre-disaster resilience component of the Emergency Response Fund available in 2020-21.
- 2. State and territory governments, in consultation with local governments and the community, were eligible to apply. The application period opened on 30 November 2021 and closed 4 February 2022.
- 3. 37 applications were received, for a total funding request of \$86.35 million, with representation from all states and territories. Where applications included prioritisation of the projects this information is included in <u>Attachment A</u>.

5. On Monday 21 February 2022, a Technical Advisory Panel comprised of experts from CSIRO, the Bureau of Meteorology and the Australian Climate Service conducted a technical review of applications against Assessment Criteria 2 and 6. The Panel was chaired by the National Recovery and Resilience Agency.

7. On Thursday 24 February 2022, the Program Review Panel comprised of representatives from the Department of Agriculture, Water and Environment, Department of Infrastructure, Transport, Regional Development and Communications, the Bureau of Metrology and the National Recovery and Resilience Agency (Chair) who assessed, rated and ranked the 18 projects against the Program Guidelines and Assessment Criteria as per the following:

Rating	Description	Score
Excellent	Demonstrates excellent flood mitigation infrastructure impact.	7-10
Good	Demonstrates good flood mitigation infrastructure impact.	4-6
Satisfactory	Demonstrates satisfactory flood mitigation infrastructure impact.	0-3

Project Funding Recommendation

- 8. On 25 February 2022 the eligible projects were endorsed by the Coordinator-General and are provided for your consideration and approval, as the decision maker for grants made from the Emergency Response Fund under the *Emergency Response Fund Act 2019* (see <u>Attachment B</u>).
- 9. The Program Guidelines provide for consideration of the equitable distribution of funding. As the funding requested for approved projects is \$162,531 above the \$50 million allocation for the Program, the National Recovery and Resilience Agency is proposing to s 47B, s 47C, s 47E(d)

for reducing funding for this project takes into account the following:

- a. only applying any funding reduction to applications rated 'Satisfactory';
- b. overall equity of funding spread across all projects; and
- c. ensuring any reduction would not jeopardise implementation of the project. The reduction of 3 per cent for the ACT project would not jeopardise implementation of the project, however, a 27 per cent reduction for either of the two Queensland Satisfactory projects is expected to impact project implementation.

Critical timing on decision making

- 10. The NRRA is seeking your decision on which projects to fund under this Program before the 14 March 2022 to ensure the timeframes under the *Emergency Response Fund Act 2019* are met ahead of the expected caretaker period. This timing also aligns with your preference to announce the projects by April 2022 (MS21-000594 refers).
- 11. Following approval of the projects, the legislation requires that you write to the Minister for Finance, Senator the Hon Simon Birmingham, providing a direction to initiate the drawdown of the funds. A letter to the Minister for Finance and the Direction to Drawdown Funds have been drafted for your signature at <u>Attachments B</u> and <u>Attachment C</u>.
 - a. The drawdown process takes approximately six weeks but can occur during the caretaker period if the Minister for Finance has given the direction to the Department of Finance before this time.
 - b. The drawdown from the Emergency Response Fund must occur by 30 June 2022 or access to the funding allocation for this financial year will expire and the Program therefore cannot be delivered.
 - c. The funding agreements with the jurisdictions do not need to be finalised before the drawdown occurs. The \$50 million in funding will remain in the Council of Australian Governments Account until agreements have been negotiated and finalised with each of the states and territories that is receiving program funding. The negotiations with the states and territories will be managed by the National Recovery and Resilience Agency and can continue during the caretaker period.
- 12. Once you have approved the projects you wish to fund under this Program, the National Recovery and Resilience Agency will prepare letters for your signature to state and territory emergency management ministers to inform them of the successful projects in their jurisdictions.

13. The National Recovery and Resilience Agency will then work with state and territory governments to develop bilateral agreements and determine project specific timeframes, including: funding delivery, estimated dates of completion, project delivery milestones, and audit and assurance mechanisms.

Risks and sensitivities

- 14. There is significant risk to the Program if an election is called and the Government enters a caretaker period before you have made a decision on the projects approved for funding and before the direction is given to the Minister for Finance to initiate the drawdown as the funds available from the Emergency Response Fund in 2021-22 expire on 30 June 2022.
- 15. It is important that the states and territories are notified of the successful projects in a coordinated manner to ensure they are all informed within the same timeframes. Applicants may have technical questions about the terms of their offer, including where the amount awarded is different from the amount requested.



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

- 2. The funding will be delivered under Schedules to the Federation Funding Agreements Environment which require co-signature by you and the relevant minister from each state

- 6. The Schedules will expire on completion of the project, including final performance reporting and processing of final payments against milestones.
- 7. The NRRA is continuing to engage with counterparts in these jurisdictions on the status of the Schedules.

- 8. The approved projects were announcement in May 2021. Signing of the Schedules was impeded due to an administrative oversight. This delayed the original date for the payment of the funding under this program to the jurisdictions. Payment could not occur on or around 9 September 2021 as originally planned and discussed with jurisdictions.
- 9. Further delays in co-signature of the four Schedules provided may not meet the deadlines for the November pay run to states and territories. This will invite scrutiny and further delay the commencement and delivery of the projects funded under this program.

Critical timing for delivery of programs under the ERF

- 16. There is an expectation from jurisdictions that this program will open for applications shortly. An announcement in November will provide sufficient time for the application and assessment processes (scheduled for February 2022), and the approval and announcement of projects from April 2022. It is important that jurisdictions have sufficient time to collate and compile applications and consult with local governments and communities, noting that the applications will be open over disaster season and the Christmas period.
- 17. Finalisation of the process at this time is critical as the annual allocation accessible under the ERF expires at the end of the financial year, and the process to drawdown the funds takes approximately six weeks. Consequently funding for successful projects from the 2021-22 NFMIP must be approved by no later than early May 2022 to enable sufficient time to drawdown the funds from the ERF.
- 18. While the approval of the projects must occur by this time, the funds only need to be held in the Treasury COAG Reform Fund by 30 June 2022. The funding will be transferred to states and territories once the Schedules to the Federation Funding Agreements Framework are agreed between the Commonwealth and each state or territory approved to receive funding for projects.
- 19. The states and territories will spend the funding within the specific project timeframe, with milestones and reporting requirements outlined through the Schedule. This timing will vary between projects depending on the project complexity.

Background

- 20. The Emergency Response Fund is an investment fund that has legislated annual spending limits, including \$50 million for achieving resilience, preparedness, or reduction of risk for a future natural disaster or building the long-term sustainability of communities in an area at risk of being affected by a future natural disaster.
- 21. The decision of the ERC to continue funding national flood mitigation infrastructure priorities was announced in parliament by the former Minister for Emergency Management, the Hon David Littleproud MP. States and territories are aware of this announcement and are expecting program applications to open in the second half of 2021.
- 22. Since floods are the most costly natural disaster, flood mitigation is a high impact investment. Reducing flood related risks through pre-disaster mitigation measures aligns with the recommendations of both the Royal Commission into National Natural Disaster

Arrangements and the Productivity Commission Report on Natural Disaster Funding and the Guiding Principles of the National Disaster Risk Reduction Framework.

- 23. Currently disaster-related expenditure is largely focused on the post disaster recovery phase. Effective mitigation and risk reduction expenditure is a proven to reduce the long-term impacts and costs associated with natural disasters. As such, the construction or improvement of flood mitigation infrastructure under the ERF is a valuable investment and reduces the risks to Australian communities.
- 24. The Bureau of Meteorology has advised that Australia is currently experiencing the effects of La Niña. This is the phase of the El Niño Southern Oscillation (ENSO) over the Pacific Ocean that often leads to wetter-than-average conditions for eastern Australia and can pose a flood risk. A continued focus on flood mitigation infrastructure projects is therefore timely in the current context.
- 25. The Agency will work with your office to announce the projects from April 2022.

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

On Tuesday 30 November 2021, I announced the opening of a second round of the National Flood Mitigation Infrastructure Program (the Program) for 2021-22, providing \$50 million of pre-disaster resilience funding from the Emergency Response Fund.

The Program will now deliver \$100 million over two years for projects that will prepare and protect Australian communities from future devastating flood events.

The second round of the Program builds on the success of the 2020-21 Program, with a renewed focus in targeting levees, levee systems, infrastructure to promote flood plain restoration and specific green infrastructure initiatives that mitigate flood risk.

It highlights the Australian Government's commitment to supporting state, territory and local governments to fund high priority flood mitigation infrastructure to assist communities to better prepare for extreme weather events and flooding. Investment in this infrastructure will provide additional benefits through the reduction in disaster recovery expenditure and improved insurance affordability while also supporting local job creation.

In line with the Program Guidelines, I remind states and territories of the importance of working with local governments and ensuring documentary evidence of these consultations is provided throughout the application process.

The Guidelines for the 2021-22 Program are available on the National Recovery and Resilience Agency's website and applications for funding are now open to states and territories.
