Round Two 2024-25 – What's new?

The Disaster Ready Fund (DRF) is the Australian Government's flagship disaster risk reduction initiative, providing up to \$1 billion over five years from 1 July 2023.

Round One delivered \$200 million to 187 projects aimed at helping communities prepare for the impacts of natural hazards. Round Two will provide up to \$200 million in 2024-25.

Round Two of the DRF builds on the experiences and outcomes from Round One, as well as feedback from extensive stakeholder consultation.

What's staying the same?

- \$200 million of Australian Government funding is available in 2024-25 through a competitive, merit-based grant process.
- Applicants will need to submit project proposals through a Lead Agency. Lead Agencies will
 coordinate the DRF in their jurisdiction and submit applications to NEMA. This recognises the
 role of states and territories in disaster planning in their jurisdictions (see Guidelines section 3).
- Round Two will continue to support a broad range of **hazard types** and include infrastructure and systemic risk reduction project streams (see *Guidelines section 3.3*).
- Project proposals will need to provide a **50 per cent co-contribution**, however the Guidelines include more information about the option to provide in-kind co-contributions (e.g. staff hours, equipment) or to apply for a waiver of this requirement (see Guidelines section 3.3).
- The three **DRF objectives** are the same (see Guidelines section 2.4).

What's new?

- Four new **Investment Principles** have been introduced to inform DRF investment. The Investment Principles encourage proposals to be risk informed and align with national, state and territory plans (see Guidelines Section 2.4).
 - This is reflected in new **Selection Criteria** (see Guidelines section 7).
- Project proposals for the Indian Ocean Territories of Christmas Island and the Cocos (Keeling) Islands are now eligible (see Guidelines section 3.2.2).
- **Multi-jurisdictional and national projects** that involve collaboration and delivery across multiple jurisdictions can be submitted through one Lead Agency which will seek endorsement from its minister (see Guidelines section 5).
- **Modest administration funding** will be provided for Lead Agencies of up to 1.5 per cent of total successful funding. This must be matched by the Lead Agency (see Guidelines section 6.2).
